County Agent Eillerup reports that a car load of 37 head of good Holstein cows and heifers was delivered to various farmers of Apache county last week. This stock was bought in the Salt River valley, and buyers from Apache county are still in the valley securing more of these fine animals to be placed in Navajo and Apache counties. Some prefer the dairy shorthorns, while others are choosing the Holsteins.—Holbrook News.

The Navajo county highway commission, appointed by the board of supervisors to spend the money derived from the sale of the road bonds, met in Holbrook Tuesday, and organized by electing John R. Hulet for chairman, and W. E. Ferguson for secretary, both of Holbrook. The secretary was directed to request the presence of the state engineer at a meeting of the commission to be held in the near future, for the purpose of securing his opinion as to road conditions in the county, and the most advisable manner of proceeding with the work.—Winslow Mail.

Transporting liquors into Arizona is now a federal offense, the Reed amendment having taken effect July 1st. Under the provisions of this law a person convicted of having liquors in his possession will be subject to a fine of \$1000 or six months imprisonment, or both. Twenty-three states come under the law at this time, and by the close of the year several more states will be affected, as soon as their local prohibition laws become effective. With the government and the secret service interested in the conviction of violators of the liquor laws, the boot-legger will have a hard road to travel.—Winslow Mail.

The President has issued regulations to govern the drafting which is to be begun soon, probably about the middle of this month. No class exceptions are to be made. The names of those drawn will be published as soon known.

The following are listed as those who must be exempted: Federal and state officers, ministers, divinity students, persons in military or naval service, German subjects, other aliens without first papers, county and municipal officers, customs clerks, workmen in federal armories, arsenals and navy yards; persons in the federal service designated by president, pilots, merchant sailors, those with status towards dependents making exclusion desirable (dependent wife or children, or parent or dependent widow, or parent or brother, dependent orphan under 15); those morally deficient and any member of a well recognized religious sect existing May 18 whose creed forbids participation in war and whose religious convictions accord with their creed.

Sale of Firearms Stopped in the State.

Douglas.—As a result of an unusually heavy demand for small arms and ammunition, particularly shotguns and shotgun shells, coupled with the increase of labor disturbances in Arizona, Brig. Gen. H. A. Greene has ordered "an embargo placed on the sale of all kinds of shotguns and small arms ammunition, including caliber .22 and larger," applicable to the Arizona district from New Mexico to the California line.

Birdno Reappointed Receiver Land Office.

John J. Birdno, receiver of public moneys, United States Land Office, at Phoenix, Arizona, was reappointed for another four year term by President Wilson, June 29th.

Mr. Birdno has made a splendid record in his office as receiver of public moneys, and his reappointment was made in recognition of his good services as a Federal officer.—Graham Guardian.

Phoenix.—The Hunt-Campbell contest has advanced another step by the filing of the record in the case on appeal from the judgment of Judge Stanford, in the supreme court. FRED COLTER VISITS NOGALES.

Hon. Fred T. Colter, Arizona's Democratic National Committeeman, who is being urged by prominent leaders of the Democratic party to make the race for governor of Arizona, next year, was a business visitor in Nogales this week a couple of days. Mr. Colter is a native of Arizona, having been born at Colter, Apache Co., where he made a big fortune in the cattle and mercantile business. He has held a number of state and county positions of trust and stands high in the councils of his party. As standard bearer, it is thought, all factions of the party would rally around Fred Colter, and our friends, the Republican enemy, defeated in every county in the state. While here Mr. Colter called on State Representative Marsh, Senator Harry Karns, Collector of Customs Hardy and other prominent citizens.—Nogales Border Vidette.

According to press reports the citizens of Globe, estimated at 500, held a meeting July 6. at which resolutions were passed declaring the I. W. W. to be a public enemy of the United States. The resolutions were:

"That terrorism in this community must and shall cease.

"That all public assemblies, of the I. W. W. as well as all other meetings where treasonable, incendiary or threatening speeches are made, shall be suppressed.

"That we hold the I. W. W. to be a public enemy of the United States.

"That we absolutely oppose any mediation between the I. W. W. and the mine owners of this district.

"That after the settlement of the strike we are opposed to the employment of any I. W. W. in this district.

"That all citizens who have been deputized be retained until peace is restored in the district."
