WOODPECKERS SPOILED POLE

A 150-foot flagstaff, made from a fir tree on the playground of the Ravenna grade school, Seattle, Wash., has had to be removed because woodpeckers riddled it with holes. It was observed that while national colors were flying from the lofty pole the birds did not bother the trunk, but as soon as the janitor removed the colors woodpeckers came from nearby woods and worked at it. About 100 feet up the wood was pecked out so much as to be discernible from the ground. When lowered the pole broke at this point first. It was believed dangerous to pupils on the playground.

FOR FIGHTING FIRE!

Fire-fighting apparatus has been improved upon to the extent of equipping large trucks with individual motor drives in each wheel and raising or lowering the ladders by air and hydraulic pressure, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. The current for the driving motors is supplied from powerful storage batteries which are suspended beneath the frame of the vehicle. An air compressor, driven by a gasoline engine, is incorporated in the outfit and furnishes the necessary elevating power for the heavy ladders, the lowering of these being accomplished with the aid of oil brakes, or compressed cylinders. The action of the ladders is so simple that only one man is required to operate them.

AS TO JAPANESE JOURNALISM

Within the Space of a Decade Remarkable Progress Has Been Made in Newspaper Publishing.

Doctor Miyoke, editor of Nihon Oyobi Nihonjin, has recently printed an interesting review of Japanese journalism.

The first daily paper was established in Japan 52 years ago. The author estimates that the benefits the country has received from the establishment of a public press bear to the evils that the press has produced about the ratio of three to two.

Wonderful progress has been made in newspaper publishing within ten years, so that papers of a decade ago look juvenile to the Japanese today. The early papers had no cable service and comparatively few feature articles. Today some Japanese dailies have a circulation of 750,000.

While most of the great newspapers of Japan were founded to promote a cause, a theory, or the personal fortunes of some public man, under present conditions they must prove successful as commercial undertakings if they are to survive and wield influence. Newspapers are today run for profit primarily, and for ideals and personal ends only in a secondary sense.

A generation ago college men seldom condescended to take up journalism. Now university graduates throng the editorial rooms of all the leading papers.—Living Age.

HAS GREAT PHYSICAL ENERGY

Experiments Have Shown Wonderful Power That is Exercised by a Growing Squash.

It has been estimated that the physical energy of the sap in a plant is fourteen times that of the blood in man. The Massachusetts Agricultural college has succeeded in measuring the power of a growing squash. It was harnessed in iron, put in prison, and given a weight to lift. The squash was placed in a box in such a way that it could grow only by pushing upward and lifting a long lever on which weights were suspended. In three months the squash was lifting 5,000 pounds. How much more it could have carried is not known, for at this point the iron harness cut into the rind, thus putting an end to the experiment.

The squash weighed 47 pounds and had a rind about three inches thick. When opened it was found to contain the usual number of seeds, which were in perfect condition.

In the first stage of the experiment an iron bar an inch square was used as a lever, then a larger bar, then a chestnut plank, then one of seasoned white oak and finally a chestnut block 5x6 inches and 9 feet long.—Illustrated World.
