

Articles of Incorporation of The MERCHANTS and STOCK GROWERS BANK, of Holbrook, Arizona

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That we, the undersigned, have this day associated ourselves together for purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the Territory of Arizona, and for that purpose do adopt, execute and acknowledge the following articles of incorporation,

FIRST. The name of this corporation shall be "The Merchants and Stock Growers Bank of Holbrook, Arizona.

SECOND. The names of the incorporators are G. T. Cline, John R. Hulet, Adolf Schuster, Robert Scott and H. H. Scorse.

THIRD. The Principal place in which the business of the corporation is to be carried on is at Holbrook, Navajo County, in the Territory of Arizona, but the corporation may have branch offices and places of business at such other places in Arizona as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

FOURTH. The general nature of the business proposed to be transacted by the corporation is that of a general banking business. It may buy, sell and deal in exchange of all kind; it may own, acquire, hold and sell such real estate as the Directors may deem advisable in the transaction and carrying on of a general banking business; it may issue notes, bonds and other evidence of indebtedness and secure the payment of the same by mortgage or otherwise; it may act as administrator, executor, receiver, trustee or in any other fiduciary capacity and do a general trust business; it may receive money on deposit, payable on demand or at a definite period, and may if the Board of Directors so determine pay interest on term deposits; it may acquire its own or the capital stock of other corporations; it may borrow and loan money, buy, sell, discount, pledge, hold and deal in all kinds of negotiable or other paper, including promissory notes, bills of exchange, mortgages, stocks, bonds city, school, county, Territorial and other warrants; it may buy, sell and deal in gold, silver, bullion and ores; it may loan money on personal security or on collateral, or on real or personal property as may be determined by the Board of directors, and may do any and all things necessary or advisable in the transaction and carrying on of a general banking business, or incidental thereto, as fully and completely as a natural person might or could do.

FIFTH. The authorized amount of capital stock of this corporation shall be Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, and shall be divided into five hundred (500) shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each; all of said stock shall be fully subscribed for and Twenty Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars thereof shall be actually paid into the corporation before the corporation begins the transaction of business. The remaining Twenty-five Thousand (25,000.00) Dollars of said capital stock shall be paid in at such times as the Board of Directors may call for the same; all said capital stock shall be paid for in cash, or its equivalent at not less than its par value.

SIXTH. The affairs of said corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of five persons. Until the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January, 1910, the following named persons shall constitute the Board of Directors of this corporation: G. T. Cline, John R. Hulet, Adolf Schuster, Robert Scott and H. H. Scorse.

The stockholders of this corporation shall hold an annual meeting on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January, 1910, and annually thereafter, and at such annual stockholders' meetings a Board of Directors shall be elected to hold office for the ensuing year.

SEVENTH. The Board of Directors of said corporation shall elect a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Cashier, and such other officers as may be provided in the by-laws. Such officers shall hold office until the election of the next Board of Directors at the next annual stockholders' meeting and each successive Board of Directors shall elect the foregoing officers.

EIGHT. The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be the date of the filing of a certified copy of these Articles of Incorporation in the office of the Territorial Auditor of Arizona, and the termination thereof shall be twenty five (25) years thereafter.

NINTH. Any vacancy occurring in the

Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining members of the Board until the next annual stockholders' meeting.

TENTH. All stockholders may be represented either by stockholders in person or by proxies at all Stockholders' meetings.

ELEVENTH. The private property of stockholders, officers and Directors of this corporation shall be exempt from all corporate debts of any kind whatsoever.

TWELFTH. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability, direct or contingent, to which this corporation is at any one time to subject itself, except for liability on deposits is Thirty-three Thousand (\$33,000.00) Dollars.

Spain having Trouble

Madrid, Spain, July 31.—The government's silence as to the loss of life at Barcelona is still unbroken and no statement is vouchsafed giving an exact and adequate idea of the bloody incidents attending the repression of the revolution. Tonight summary of the situation show that conditions at Barcelona are greatly improved and the belief prevails here that by tomorrow all will be over.

No information as to the number of revolutionists court-martialed and shot has reached Madrid. Throughout Catalonia the situation is decidedly calmer and report from other parts of the county bring news of a similar improvement in conditions.

At Melilla the Moors are actively preparing for a new attack upon the Spaniards, but General Marina has been instructed that as soon as the big army is concentrated to assume the offensive, march out of Melilla and strike a decisive blow.

Mexico has an Earthquake

Mexico City, July 31.—Mexico City again was severely shaken by an earthquake today. A shock more severe than any yet experienced, rocked the city for one minute and forty seconds. The first faint swaying came at 12:43, but the nervous people needed nothing more than the slightest tremble to send them pouring out of the stores, office building and dwellings into the street. The shock attained great intensity at the end of the first thirty seconds and suddenly shifted the direction of its motion. It began with a long swaying north to south oscillatory motion which changed to a bumping action. No great damage was done, though many walls weakened by the three shock of yesterday fell while many public buildings were cracked.

The national palace suffered considerably. The war office chamber of ambassadors and other sections of handsome buildings were damaged. The National Life Insurance company building the Stillwell building and the Cathedral were among the large edifices the walls of which suffered. At Acapulco, the customhouse with its warehouse military barracks and a number of other prominent buildings were absolutely destroyed, while the municipal palace suffered serious damage.

Tariff Doings

Gleaned from the Dailies

Washington, July 31.—By a vote of 195 to 183 the house tonight adopted the conference report on the tariff bill. A great republican demonstration followed.

Twenty republicans vote against the report and two democrats for it. The vote was the climax of an eleven hours' session conducted through the most oppressive heat, and it was enlivened by a dozen or more speeches of a more or less fiery nature. The temperature did not deter a throng from going to the capitol to witness the closing scenes.

The day opened with what appeared to be a part of an organized filibuster against the conference report, when Mr. Mondell of Wyoming demanded the reading of the lengthy document. This proceeded for about an hour and a half when with about two-thirds of the report yet to be read, Mr. Mondell permitted the debate to go on.

Mr. Payne defended the report and appealed to his republican colleagues to support it, prophesying at the same time that when the bill was enacted into a law, it would meet with the approval of the country.

Mr. Clark, the minority leader and many of his colleagues denounced the bill and criticized the republican for failing as he alleged, to revise the tariff downward and thus keep the party pledges.

Perhaps the most sensational speech of all was by Mr. Mann of Illinois, republican, who said he would vote against the report provided the rates on pulp and print paper as reduced by the house were not retained. He denounced that particular schedule and declared that Canada would take such action regarding pulp wood and print paper as to place an almost prohibitive price upon paper in this country.

At 9:07 p.m. the house with the conference report ready to be sent to the senate for action, adjourned until Monday at noon.

Washington, Aug. 1.—Unless something happens to provoke heated political wrangles the new tariff bill should be enacted into a law, and the extraordinary session of congress adjourned before the end of the week. The senate will meet tomorrow morning. An inquiry among the senators opposed to the conference report indicates that the debate will be extended. Mr. Aldrich has determined that the conferee's report shall not be carried into next week. The opponents of free hides will probably discuss that subject, and the republican who voted against the bill on its passage many take occasion to expain their motives. Mr. Culberson the democratic leader, is authority for the statement that the democrats will not filibuster against the adoption of the conference report.
