**Forest Range Management**

The forage resources of the national forests are pointed as contributing to the maintenance of over twenty million head of livestock, which supply in part at least the demands for meat, hides, or wool of every state in the Union. The receipts from grazing during 1913, though second to those in timber, were more than a million dollars, and showed an increase over the previous year in spite of the fact that the season was less favorable and the area reduced. Over 4 per cent more stock was grazed as the result of increased forage production and improvements in handling stock, especially sheep.

The system of range management employed by the forest service is held to offer hope of relief to the average citizen concerned over the dwindling supply of meat products and their alarming rise in cost. The national forests furnish abundant forage supplies, opportunity for the adoption of the best methods, freedom from livestock diseases, and the protection in the enjoyment of all rights and privileges. Cattle from the Hayden national forest in Colorado took the grand championship prize at the national live stock show in Denver, and in many cases the lambs from the forests topped the market. Losses from predatory animals are growing less as the wolves, bears, and other animals are killed off by forest officers.

**Wonders of the Wireless**

Voices were heard for forty miles by wireless telephone and music five or six miles further, Julius Pohle, a wireless telegraph operator at Port Arthur, Texas, testified in the federal court in New York, in defense of Lee DeForrest, Samuel E. Darby, Elmer E. Burlingame and James Dunlop, on trial for alleged misuse of the mails in promoting stock for the Radio Wireless Telephone company.

Pohle testified he went around the world with the Atlantic squadron and the experiments with his wireless telephone during the cruise were satisfactory. For nine hours without break he operated the telephone, he said, and at Port Townsend, Washington, the apparatus met with particular success.—Journal.

**Auto Licenses**

Twenty thousand nine hundred and thirty-three dollars is the amount of fees received from motor vehicle and chauffeur licenses, transfers and extra seals, by the office of Secretary of State S. P. Osborn, from September 2, 1912, to the present time.

The entire amount, except that portion to defray the office expense of getting out the licenses, is to go to the engineer's office for maintenance of Arizona roads.

Motor vehicle licenses amounting to \$16,948.50, chauffeur licenses \$3,517, and extra seals \$467.50, making a total of \$20,933.

The total number of licenses issued is 3,583. The number of automobiles over 40 h. p. was 91 and those under 40 h. p. 2,832, motor cycles 485, motor trucks 165, electric vehicles 10, automobiles transferred 138, motorcycle transfers 10, extra seals sold 92, chauffeur licenses issued 703.—St. Johns Observer.




