Another Strike of Miners

Trouble is again brewing in
the Clifton-Morenci copper min-
ing district between the mine-
owners and their employees.
Most of these employees are
foreigners and practically all of
them have joined the Western
Federation of Miners. The
Western Federation of Miners,
dominated as it is now by such
notorious law-breakers as Chas.
F. Moyer, has sunk to the lowest
depth of disrepute among all fair
minded people, and wherever it
is allowed to exist trouble, and
serious trouble, is sure to come.

The latest trouble in the Clif-
ton-Morenci district was started
by the Mexican and Spanish
miners a few days ago. They
totally disregarded the arguement
that they had with their em-
ployers to submit their grievan-
ces to arbitration; they simply
quit work and the mines and
concentrators were forced to close.
The action of these men was un-
doubtedly inspired by men higher
up in the councils of the federa-
tion—men who do not work them-
selves, but grab in salaries every
penny the miners can be induced
to pay into the treasury. These
leeches live upon the earnings of
their more ignorant fellow men,
and when their funds run low
they call a strike in order that
they may share in the contribu-
tions made by sympathisers.

The writer is a friend to labor
and believes in laboring men
organizing for their own advance-
ment. The labor unions of the
country have done a vast amount
of good, both in bettering the
condition of the laboring people
and in establishing more amica-
ble relations between employer
and employee. But there are
good unions and bad unions; for
the good unions—and a vast ma-
jority of them are good—we have
the highest respect. For the
bad unions—and the Western Fed-
eration of Miners is the worst of
the lot—we have only contempt
and condemnation. It should be
repudiated by all fair-minded
persons and its existence in Ariz-
ona should be made impossible.

Railroad Company May Build

Immediately after the bids for
the construction of the new
school house in Holbrook were
examined, and found to call for
the expenditure of a larger
amount of money than is availa-
ble, the school board made a
proposition to Superintendent R.
H. Tuttle of the Santa Fe for the
railroad company to construct the
building.

This action of the school board
was taken because of the fact
that the plans and specifications
for the proposed building were
made by the railroad company's
architect, Mr. Wells, and he had
stated to the trustees that com-
pany contractors could and would
build the school house for the
amount of money available,
which, since paying for the site
and other incidental expenses, is
about \$22,000.

Replying to the communication
of the school board, Mr. Tuttle
wrote under date of June 24 that
he would at once take up the
matter with the management of
the company and would advise
the board fully as to the decision.

Should the railroad company
decide to construct the building,
according to the plans already
prepared, for the amount of
money available, a difficult prob-
lem will be happily solved. Other-
wise new plans will have to be
prepared, or more money will
have to be raised, either of which
will necessitate delay, a thing to
be regretted, especially since the
school building will be badly
needed when the fall term of
school opens.

Ranch House Burned

The large ranch home of James
Scott, near Pinedale, together
with a store room adjoining, was
totally destroyed by fire early
last Saturday morning. The loss
is about \$4,000 and there was no
insurance.

The fire started from an ex-
plosion of gasoline which was
being used by a woman servant
in cleaning a dress. The ex-
plosion threw the woman through
a window into the yard; her
clothing was not ignited and her
injuries were slight.

At the time of the fire Mr.
Scott and his daughter, Mrs. Baz-
zell, were in Holbrook. Another
daughter, Mrs. Chadwick, the
woman servant and her husband,
were at the ranch. Mrs. Chad-
wick succeeded in saving a few
articles of wearing apparel and
some valuable papers belonging
to her father. Outside of these
things the house, which contained
8 rooms and was handsomely
furnished, and the storeroom filled
with provisions, were totally
destroyed.

When the report of the fire
reached Holbrook, Dr. and Mrs.
Bazell drove by automobile to
the ranch and brought Mrs. Chad-
wick to Holbrook.

Mr. Scott takes his loss phi-
losophically and has already started
preliminary work for rebuilding.
