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TO CORRECT BILL PASSED LAST YEAR To correct the defects in Senate Bill 90, passed by the fourth state legislature, the attorney general's office is preparing a bill which will be introduced during the present session. According to Attorney General Galbraith, the proposed legislation will correct the ambiguity in the present law, giving a particular meaning to what constitutes a specific appropriation. An effort will be made if the bill carries to have it bear the emergency clause. According to legislative enactment \$750,000 was appropriated for the common school fund while another appropriation for the same fund of \$125,000 was made. Both were special appropriations and according to the law no money should be spent for the common schools in excess of the special appropriation. Under the enabling act and the constitution the common school fund may be increased making a difference of \$50,000 a year in one fund alone. Whether or not the amount can be spent under the special appropriation fund is not clear under the present law.

AMENDMENTS TO ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE JENNINGS AUTOMOBILE COMPANY We the undersigned Charles H. Jennings, president, and Fritz Goebel, Secretary of the Jennings Automobile Company, a corporation, do hereby certify that on the 23rd day of December, 1920, at the hour of 10 A. M., a meeting of the stockholders of said corporation was duly held at the office and place of business of said corporation, in the City of Holbrook, State of Arizona, pursuant to due and regular notice to each of said stockholders.

That at said meeting the following Resolutions were passed, and adopted by unanimous vote by the stockholders of said corporation: "RESOLVED, that the capital stock of this corporation be increased to Forty Thousand Dollars, and that the stockholders of said corporation be authorized to execute and file with the County Recorder of the County of Navajo, State of Arizona, the amendments to the original Articles of Incorporation, showing such increase in the capital stock of the corporation and of the indebtedness to which said corporation may be subject."

That said proceedings were had and taken under and pursuant to Section 2102 of the Civil Code of the State of Arizona. That pursuant to the said above-mentioned Resolutions adopted at said stockholders' meeting, we the undersigned Charles H. Jennings, President and Fritz Goebel, Secretary of the Jennings Automobile Company, have amended the Articles of Incorporation of the said Jennings Automobile Company so that the amendments to the original Articles IV and VIII of the original Articles of Incorporation shall read as follows: Article IV.

The authorized capital stock of this corporation shall be Forty Thousand Dollars, and shall be divided into Four Hundred shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each. At such times as the board of directors may by resolution direct, said capital stock shall be paid into this corporation either in cash or by the sale and transfer to it of real or personal property, contracts, services, or any other valuable right or thing for the uses and purposes of the said corporation, in payment for which shares of the capital stock of the said corporation may be issued, and the capital stock so issued shall thereupon and thereby become and be fully paid up and non-assessable, and in the absence of actual fraud in the transaction, the judgment of the directors as to the value of the property purchased or services rendered shall be conclusive.

Article VIII. The highest amount of indebtedness direct or contingent to which this corporation shall be subject at any time shall be \$28,666.00; which amount does not exceed two-thirds of the capital stock of this corporation. This is to certify that the foregoing copy of Resolutions adopted and passed by the stockholders of the Jennings Automobile Company on the 23rd day of December, 1920, is true and correct; and we do further certify that the undersigned Charles H. Jennings is President and the undersigned Fritz Goebel is Secretary of said corporation.

BIDS ARE OPENED FOR WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM

The council met in adjourned session Tuesday evening to receive the bids for the installation of a sewer and water system, and also for the construction of the sidewalk along Porter Street.

There was only one bid for the sidewalk, that of R. C. Whitson, who offered to lay the walk according to specifications for 30 cents a square foot, but owing to an irregularity in the bid it was rejected, but the contract will probably be awarded him at the regular meeting to be held February 9th.

But there was a lot of interest manifested when it came to the bids for the construction of the water and sewer system.

There were three bids submitted. Charles Phoenix bid \$135,000 and offered to take the bonds in payment. The Steel Products Co. of El Paso bid \$135,000 and D. K. Ware of El Paso bid \$152,000, also offering to take the bonds in payment.

None of the bids were in strict compliance with the specifications—as many of the essential points in the specifications were obscure to the bidders.

After discussion of the bids the board agreed to postponement of action until the regular meeting February 9th.

The matter as to whether or not sufficient water could be obtained was discussed.

R. C. Kline, of Winslow, Division Engineer of the Santa Fe was present and took of the difficulties the Santa Fe had encountered in developing sufficient water, and the willingness of the Santa Fe to assist the council in working out a plan for a water supply. The experience of the Santa Fe experts were tendered the council, without charge, and it is possible that by February 9th a plan will be worked out whereby work will be begun on the project at once.

THINGS DOING IN THE HOLBROOK OIL FIELD

The Adamana is now drilling at 110 feet in the cap rock, with indications as promising as ever. The work is progressing uninterruptedly, although owing to the hardness of the formation headway is slow.

Their geologist advises them that they are very close to the sand reported in both the Hopi and Holbrook wells.

This sand carries oil—and there is no doubt in the minds of oil men but that the Adamana will be brought in before much more depth is attained.

The ratchet socket which had to be exchanged before the Holbrook well could resume work has arrived and was taken to the well yesterday.

Manager Jack Marden was in town a couple of days this week before leaving for the coast where he will meet Geologist Reid in San Francisco to discuss present conditions at the well. Mr. Marden states that the showing at the well was more than encouraging, and coming direct from the management, which has always been reticent, this statement should carry considerable weight.

It is expected that Geologist Major will accompany Mr. Marden on his return within the next few days.
