### GOSSIP GOSSIP FROM AROUND THE TOWN

Mrs. R. S. Teeple spent Thursday in Winslow.

James H. Scorse returned Tuesday evening from an extended visit in Phoenix.

Manager C. W. Cook of the Adamana is in Oatman this week on business.

T. O. Evans returned Wednesday from Albuquerque where he had gone for a quite serious operation for tonsillitis.

Mrs. James H. Scorse returned Wednesday morning from a visit with relatives and friends in Pasadena, San Francisco, Fresno and Richmond California.

Mrs. M. H. Dowell, mother of Mrs. H. G. Stites, who has been visiting with relatives in Kansas for the past three months returned to Holbrook Tuesday morning.

The storm which passed over Arizona Saturday and Sunday left 18 inches of snow at Cooley and six inches of snow at Fort Apache, according to reports made to the local weather bureau.

Supervisors Owens and Richards are in Phoenix this week, where Mr. Owens is the county's representative to the Good Roads convention which is now in session.

Fred Croxon, forest ranger, charged with the murder of Charles Quayle, an Arizona rancher was freed after a preliminary hearing before a justice of the peace in Flagstaff Tuesday.

County Attorney Greer left for Winslow yesterday morning with blood in his eye and a citation on his hip for the recalcitrant J. P. of W. in an endeavor to find out when a justice of the peace is not a justice of the peace.

Merge of the Arizona Central bank and the Citizens bank of Flagstaff, was effected Tuesday by T. E. Pollick and M. L. Powers, presidents respectively of these prominent financial institutions.

To date of February 7, Arizona headquarters of the European Relief council, 524 Heard building, Phoenix, has received and transmitted to the council's controller in New York \$33,428.13, being direct contributions or contributions coming through the 14 county chairmen.

Wholesale and retail prices of bread took a sharp decline in Phoenix this week, the result of the voluntary action of local bakers. These decreases approximate 15 to 20 per cent. In practically every instance, retail prices resumed their pre-war level--10 cents a loaf for 16 and 17 ounce loaves and 13 cents for 20 ounce loaves. The latter size is retailed at two loaves for 25 cents.

Miss Rose Scorse is spending the week in Pasadena and Los Angeles.

D. J. Thomas attended the meeting of the Bankers Association held in Phoenix last week.

The annual state conference of the Arizona Congress of Mothers and Parent Teacher associations will be held in Phoenix, February 25.

The case of Hazel Feek against E. B. Sisk, a department of justice investigator, will be sifted out in Judge Easley's court tomorrow morning, at ten o'clock. Reserve your tickets.

Deputy Tax Collector Lore has collected over \$5000 of the delinquent taxes since the first of the month, but this is hardly a starter compared to the long list of "overdues" on the books--some of which run into four figures. After the 15th of this month the ax will be employed and the work of separating the delinquent from the property which, to him, is not worth the taxes, will be begun.

### ARIZONA ROAD BUILDING MAY CONTINUE IS HOPE

Although orders were issued by state engineer Thomas Maddock suspending all state highway construction in Arizona because of lack of funds, there are prospects that the suspension will not be complete. Total closing would have thrown 1500 men, including many with families, out of employment.

At the state highway department it was said efforts were being made to have Greenlee and Navajo counties carry on state road building with county funds and be reimbursed when state funds became available.

### ADAMANA NOTES

An automobile party from Chambers, consisting of Miss C. Whiteley who was very ably chaperoned by Miss Dolly McCarrol, Mr. James Walker and Mr. Hal McCarrol, were visiting friends in Adamana Wednesday. Mr. Carrol very reluctantly consented to act as chauffeur while the car was in motion, but at other times he was busy trying to lose Mr. Walker and Miss Dolly. Just why Hal should pass by a perfectly good justice of the peace at Navajo and browse around among a lot of hardshell baptists at Adamana is not quite clear.

What might have been a very serious automobile accident was narrowly averted Wednesday by the prompt action of the section foreman at Navajo Wednesday, in flagging a certain automobile party that was coming to Adamana from Chambers. After flagging the car, the foreman asked the chauffeur if he could not see clearly, and Hal answered "No. All I can see is White-ly."

Col. Wm. Nelson, custodian of the Petrified Forest has received a let-

### PETRIFICADO

### LIGHTING THE WAY WITH NEW SYSTEM

Traveling from Wichita, Kan., to Los Angeles, Calif., in a house built on a Ford truck chassis and equipped with every modern convenience, including a Coleman Lighting Plant which he is demonstrating enroute, N. B. Dilday of Wichita will pass through Holbrook soon according to word received here today.

Although accompanied by his wife and two children, and making this a combined business and pleasure trip, Mr. Dilday is using his car primarily for demonstrating the practicability and economy of the Coleman Lighting Plant for homes, churches and stores. These plants are manufactured by the Coleman Lamp Company of Wichita, Kansas, said to be the largest manufacturers of lamps, lanterns and lighting plants in the world.

The house-car has two compartments. The back and larger compartment is equipped with a folding bed, heating stove, cupboard, chiffonier and built-in drawers, and serves as dining room, living room and bed room. The front compartment is smaller and serves as a kitchenette. Just back of and to the left of the driver's seat is a water tank with sink and gasoline urn burners for cooking.

The urn burners are a part of the Coleman lighting system which furnishes gas for cooking and lighting. The fuel for the plant is all supplied from one tank which is placed in the front compartment.

The route being followed by Mr. Dilday takes him through Southwestern Kansas, Southeastern Colo-

rado, Northern New Mexico and Arizona across California to Los Angeles. All along his route Mr. Dilday is calling on merchants and demonstrating the Coleman Lighting Plant to their customers. He expects to complete his trip between May 15 and June 1.

### TO THE MINORS OF NAVAJO COUNTY, ARIZONA:

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona:

Sec. 1. That paragraph 299, Chapter 8, Title 9, of the Revised Statutes of Arizona, 1913 Penal Code, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

(Pertaining to offenses committed against good morals.)

Sec. 299. It shall be unlawful for any person in the state of Arizona to sell, give or furnish, or cause to be sold or given or furnished, any cigars, cigarettes, or cigarette papers, smoking or chewing tobacco of any kind or character to any person under the age of twenty-one years, and it shall be unlawful for any minor in the State of Arizona, to buy, accept or receive from any person, any cigars, cigarettes or cigarette papers, smoking or chewing tobacco of any kind or character.

Sec. 2. All acts and parts of acts in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed, Feb. 27, 1917.

The above is amended to read as follows:

That it is unlawful and a misdemeanor for any minor to have in his possession any cigar, cigarettes or cigarette papers, or any smoking or chewing tobacco, of any character.

Offenders of the above will be prosecuted upon the violation of this act.
