Messrs. H. J. Green, A. M. Wilson and C. C. Clark, composing the committee named by the Growers' Association to confer with Assistant Secretary of the Interior, Samuel Adams, and Director Newell, of the Reclamation service, report a very encouraging interview held with the officials with regard to the postponement of water payments due December 1.

It is evident from the information gathered that relief of some kind will be afforded the settlers. Both Mr. Adams and Mr. Newell appeared very much interested in the work going on here and we feel positive that a report favorable to the petitioners will be made by them to headquarters.

The average daily attendance at the Bard school steadily increases, and has now reached about fifty-three. At the completion of the new and commodious school building a strong effort will be made by the teachers and the local board of trustees to enroll as many pupils as possible and maintain a high average attendance in order to secure for this school the largest allowance of funds possible to operate the school. Fowler Leaves Tucson On Eastern Trip

Tucson, Nov. 2.—With a swift running start along the hard earth of the speedway north of the University of Arizona, Aviator Robert G. Fowler and his Model B, Wright biplane rose into the air at 2:15 this afternoon, and resumed his long journey by air from the Pacific to the Atlantic coast, with New York as the objective point.

Fowler was to have made his start at 5:00 o'clock this morning, but in drawing his aeroplane from the University Campus to the speedway where he had chosen to start his flight, a part of the machine was sprung and a delay for repairs was necessary. His mechanics finally got the machine into condition about 1:30 and from then until 2:00 o'clock Fowler personally tested every portion of the aeroplane examining the new engine which he secured in Yuma with especial solicitude.

Then at 2:15 he kissed his mother, Mrs. F. Fowler, waved good bye to the students gathered on the University grounds, and started the motor.

Rising slowly and turning to the right, he took the air at a low altitude, and flew off toward the mountain pass in the southeast, rising gradually as he went.

Fowler stated before starting that he would make stops in Benson, Lordsburg and Deming and may spend to-night at Benson if satisfactory financial arrangements can be made.

Aviator Cal R. Rodgers passed over Yuma at 8:32 this morning, and here he comes, there he goes, explains the whole flight.

He only dipped a salute to Yuma and kept on his way toward the Pacific ocean, Los Angeles and Pasadena, his objective goal.

He was flying at a height of probably 2,000 feet when he passed over Yuma and with the exception of the dip mentioned toward Mother Earth and Yuma, he kept on his course as the crow flies.

Mr. Rodgers was trying to break the record for a sustained flight, but at 9:45 one of the stay rods on the machine broke and he had to land at Imperial Junction.

He will probably leave there in the morning.

Seven Girls Burn to Death in Factory

Chehalis, Wash., Nov. 2—Fire destroyed the Imperial Powder Co.'s, factory late yesterday afternoon, causing the death of 7 young women and another who will die. Two girls escaped, but dozens of others were injured. The cause of the fire is thought to have been that some paraffine boiled over, due to the carelessness of a woman and ran into the powder. There was no explosion, the powder being non-explosive unless confined. Seven bodies were recovered.
