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Caravan of Autos Coming to Yuma

The Arizona Republican of yesterday says:

As showing how the transcontinental automobile touring idea is already growing, it is illuminating to reflect on the facts in connection with the latest party of four machines engaged in a cross country flight, three of which arrived yesterday. The other may not arrive until to-day.

It has only been a few months since the first transcontinental tours by professional pathfinding machines began to penetrate this region, and only a few weeks since the first tours conducted solely for pleasure began coming this way. The present caravan of four machines is in reality four different touring parties that assembled by chance into one company. Not one of the four individual parties knew of the existence of the other when they set out upon their journeying.

All of the tourists are traveling chiefly for pleasure, with California as their destination. Those who have arrived announce that they are enjoying themselves hugely and that Arizona roads and Arizona scenery have fully repaid them for having come this way.

The members of one party which is registered at the Ford hotel are Oscar Nelson, Frank Nelson, H. A. Carlson and their chauffeur, all from Rockford, Ill. Immediately on their arrival they were found by E. Trucraft, of the Melezer company, who knew them all in Rockford, Ill., his former home. From these gentlemen it was learned that the other party here is composed of a Denver man with three companions.

One of the machines yet to arrive carries a Mr. Ford and his party of five from Cedar Rapids, Ia, and the other now here carries M. D. Lapham and his wife, child and chauffeur, who came all the way from Rhode Island.

The machines all traveled together after they met in Kansas, until they got to Globe, Arizona, where one machine was laid up a few hours for repairs.

They all expect to spend a few days in Phoenix resting and looking over the valley, and at their leisure continue their trip to the coast via Yuma and San Diego.

Arizona National Guard Receives Equipment

The Arizona Democrat says:

One carload of equipment for the Arizona National Guard was received here yesterday by Captain Charles W. Harris, regimental quartermaster.

Within a few days another car will be received, containing guns for an entire company and complete new equipment for the cavalry troop stationed at Morenci.

Two hundred uniforms, tentage, shovels, spades and other camp equipment were included in the first car. They will be distributed among the companies over the territory as they are required.

All the companies over the territory are pretty well equipped, but some of the paraphernalia is too old and worn for service. All such will be replaced.

The cavalry troop is to be re-equipped entirely. Included in the shipment are saddles, bridles, blankets, sabers and everything else that a cavalryman requires in service.

All the companies have what guns are required and it is likely that the arms which will be in the next car, will be used for any extra company that may be organized.

A revival in drills is now expected among the members of the National Guard of Arizona. For some time the guardsmen have not been doing great deal of drilling for the regulations have been changed entirely and copies of the new manual were not received until about a week ago.

The copies have been sent out to all the companies and the captains are instructed to lose no time in bringing their companies up to a high point of efficiency in the new drills.

On the first day of December Lieutenant F. F. Jewett, of the regular army, who is attached to the National Guard of Arizona, and Captain Harris of Phoenix, will leave on a tour of inspection. They will inspect every company in the regiment as well as the cavalry troop.

Jack Williams Is a Popular Candidate

It is quite evident that the Globe Silver Belt has a high opinion of the character and ability of Jack Williams, the Republican candidate for congress.

The following interesting sketch of his career in Arizona is taken from the columns of that paper.

Major Carl Hayden, of the Arizona National Guard, Williams' Democratic opponent, seems to be depending for his vote upon the strength of the military organization of which he is the head.

"While Jack Williams has no military organization to depend upon in this campaign, he has what is a great deal more efficient, those qualities that go to make big statesmanship.

Coming to Arizona as a prospector, he spent the first years of his residence at Benson and in the surrounding mountains leading the life of a prospector. He had received a legal education, but had not practiced his profession in Arizona because of his enjoyment of the free life of the hills.

One day he came to town dressed in a flannel shirt and khaki trousers, and learned that a friend was engaged in a personal injury suit against a large corporation. The man had no money, no friends and no attorney, and Jack upon hearing of his friend's plight, volunteered his services.

No one knew of Jack's legal ability, and when he appeared before the court in his uncouth garb, everyone looked at him askance. But when he began his plea before the jury, with the eloquence which later made him famous throughout that section of Arizona, pleading the justice of the cause of his client, he won a victory that marks an epoch in the practice of the bar.

He then had no difficulty in securing clients and opened an office in Tombstone, the county seat of Cochise county.

Three years ago he was elected district attorney and his success as such has led to his present nomination.
