## Temporary Organization Of Municipal League

The opening gun for the Yuma Municipal League was fired last night at the city hall at 7:30, when quite a number of Yuma's citizens met in open meeting and formed a temporary organization.

Among those present were: J. H. Westover, George Michelsen, Max Czuczka, John Wadin, Dan Brislin, C. D. Baker, A. T. Pancrazi, O. H. Willis, J. Molina, A. L. Verdugo, R. H. Farmer, S. Frank Stauley, S. F. DeCorse, T. T. Cull, Dr. Teufert, A. J. Locke, J. R. Kerr, A. L. DeMund and W. A. Neinstedt.

Max Czuczka was made temporary chairman and W. A. Neinstedt, temporary secretary.

There was a general discussion participated in by Messrs. Czuczka, Neinstedt, Michelsen, Westover, Baker, Verdugo, Cull, Teufert, Kerr, Neinstedt, DeMund and others present in regard to the future prospective growth of Yuma making a necessity of this organization now, to aid in and encourage the improvement of Yuma's streets, sidewalks, shade trees, parks, etc., and to obtain data and ascertain the advisability of municipal ownership of public utilities.

A committee was appointed on permanent organization composed of George Michelsen, Dr. Teufert and C. D. Baker, and the temporary organization adjourned to meet next Tuesday night to affect a permanent organization, elect permanent officers and start a crusade for public improvement.

Plans are also under way for a larger attendance and an increased membership at the next meeting.

## No Room for Supreme Court

Phoenix, Feb. 13.—Not until the new state officers provide suitable quarters will there be a formal session of the Arizona Supreme Court.

There has been much speculation regarding the date on which the Supreme Court will meet to take up the calendar of regular business. Alfred Franklin, who will be Chief Justice, today declared that it is all a matter of quarters.

"The Supreme Court will not have a formal meeting until a courtroom, chambers for ourselves and space for our library are provided by the state," Judge Franklin said.

"Will it be necessary to wait for the legislature to make that provision?" he was asked.

"I do not think so. The Board of Control, in my opinion, will have ample power to take any necessary steps to obtain quarters for the Supreme Court. But under the circumstances the date on which the court will convene is rather indefinite. No announcement regarding the exact or even probable date can be made at this time.

"When we know something definite, ten days' or two weeks' notice will be sent out to all the superior judges and members of the bar in the state, acquainting them with the date on which the Supreme Court will meet to take up the calendar of business that is before it."

President Taft affixed his signature to the proclamation making Arizona a state at 10:02½, Washington time. Governor Hunt took oath of office at 11:30, Phoenix time.

The announcement of statehood for Arizona was made in Yuma this morning by the blowing of whistles and ringing of bells and while there was so set demonstration or celebration, such as was given in Phoenix to-day, still the people of Yuma were no less enthusiastic, no less glad and certainly as optimistic over the future of the "Baby" state, than those of Phoenix or any other part of the territory that was, but is no more.

To all our people this should be a proud day indeed.

Arizona is a state. From ocean to ocean the sisterhood of states is now complete, and as a great man once said: "There is glory enough for all."

The Yuma county officers will probably be sworn in to-morrow.

## Clemency of Governor Sloan

Under date of last Saturday Governor Sloan has issued, pardons, paroles, etc., to fourteen convicts, clearing the board of all cases in which recommendations had been made by the board of control.

Among those from Yuma county were:

A pardon was issued to restore citizenship to Isaac Combs who had been previously paroled.

A parole was issued to Nichols Chavez who was sentenced to serve a life term from April 18, 1897, for first degree murder committed in Yuma county.

A parole was granted Rafael Romero who was sentenced in Yuma county also, to serve a life term from April 17, 1907, for murder in the first degree.

## Stole a Check

A Mexican thought he saw visions of living without work, but now languishes in the county jail.

It is said that the aforesaid Mexican procured a gun and held up one A. Padilla, of the reclamation service, relieving him of his pay check made out in the amount of \$11.25.

The Mexican then went away and the mater was reported to the officers and this morning Officer Juan Zavala arrested the Mexican and took him to jail. He did not have the gun on him at the time of the arrest, but said he had left it in his room.

He will be given a hearing before Judge Jones to-morrow.


The check was found in his possession but he had made no attempt to endorse it.
