RECLAMATION PLAN APPROVED BY WILSON

A good investment, is the way it strikes the Examiner, that proposal of Secretary of the Interior Lane to devote \$300,000,000 to the reclamation of arid lands in the west and southwest will meet with hearty approval in Arizona where so much taxable wealth has already been created through the operation of the reclamation act under which the great reservoirs and irrigation systems at Roosevelt and Laguna have been erected. Mr. Lane has received assurances of support from a large number of congressmen and senators from the west and southwest, including the Arizona delegation, who are all keenly interested in the proposition. Arizona, and Yuma county in particular, is perhaps more vitally interested in Lane's plans than any other state, as she has a far greater area of land which may be made wonderfully productive by irrigation than any other state in the union. The plan may be broadened to include in its scope the reclamation of all the arid west, and the vast swamp lands in Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas and east of the Mississippi river. It will receive the support of many national legislators from the states which would be thus benefited. A southwestern congressman in asuring Secretary Lane of his hearty support for the scheme, said: "The investment of \$300,000,000, if that amount is needed, in the reclamation plan would be a better investment than the building of the Panama canal. As a matter of fact, whatever amount is expended in adding to the arable land of the county would be merely a temporary investment, for it would be paid back into the treasury in the sale of the land, thus giving value," he said, "while the whole country would benefit in the increased production, the widening of opportunity and the growth of a thrifty, prosperous population." This seems to be the general idea. Secretary Lane hopes to be able to outline his plan in December in his first report to Congress. If this is found to be impossible, a carefully prepared measure will be introduced in congress at the earliest possible moment and it may be said on high authority that it will have the hearty approval and support of President Wilson.
