BURGARIA DECLARES WAR ON SERBIA; ALLIES CLAIM GAINS

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Bulgaria has declared war on Serbia, according to the Central News Agency.

Bulgaria's thrust at Serbia begun on Monday night is apparently aimed at the railroad from Belgrade to Constantinople through Nish. The Serbians officially declare that the Bulgarians were repulsed, while the Germans assert that they are advancing south of the Danube, but do not mention the amount of ground gained.

Unofficially, Nish claims that the Serbians checked the Germans at several points and in some cases have thrown them back across the river.

The Germans continue hammering at Dvinsk. Elsewhere the Russians are attacking fiercely particularly in Eastern Galicia where it is reported they won a victory on the Stripa, capturing 2,000 men, 60 officers, and ten rapid firers. Now, this attack north of the Roumanian border synchronizes with the virtual opening of campaign of the central powers and Bulgaria on Serbia. Roumania's participation in the war on the side of the entente is assured, Premier Bratianu of Roumania, has given Italy to understand according to Rome advices. Roumania is choosing its own time to take the field.

Athens reports that Premier Zaimiz yesterday informed the chamber that "For the present, Greek neutrality will be armed to better assure the vital interests of Greece," and that the future military course will be adapted to meet events.

In reply to Zaimiz, former Premier Venizelos said that he did not want to cause internal dissensions and that the chamber would support the government as long as it did not alter "the principles of my policy which the chamber has already voted." He said that even if Greece had no treaty with Serbia, "our interests oblige us to depart from neutrality as another state wishes to aggrandize itself at our expense."

In view of the costly failure of German attacks at Loos and the progress of the French south of Souchez, and the gradual extension of their gains near Tahure, the outlook on the Franco-Belgian front is regarded here as more favorable to the entente allies.

SUIT NOT PRESSED
OWING TO INFIRMITIES

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—At the trial of the former directors of the New York, New Haven & Hartford R. R., who are charged with conspiracy to monopolize the traffic of the New England states, which opened today, the government counsel failed to mention the name of George Miller, aged 83, one of the twelve defendants cited to appear. It was explained that the government would not press the case against him on account of his infirmities due to age.

FOREIGN MINISTER OF FRANCE HAS RESIGNED

PARIS, Oct. 13.—Foreign Minister Delcasse has handed in his resignation, and it has been accepted. Viviani was immediately appointed to take the portfolio. Illness is given as the cause of the resignation of Delcasse.

OVER 2,000,000 MEN OF EUROPE LOSE LIMBS

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—Over two million men have suffered loss of limbs or faculties, or both, as a result of the European war, according to Frank B. Gilbreth, of Providence, R. I., who has just returned from Germany, where he studied the methods of giving employment to cripples.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13.—Fred E. Pierce, of Los Angeles, in addressing the National Convention of Funeral Directors today, outlined the fashion for funeral directors as "neat and un-gaudy."

"Funeral directors," said Mr. Pierce, "should be serious but not gloomy, dignified but not morose, gentle but not fawning, self-possessed but not self-conscious, quietly masterful but not bossy, alert but not fussy, sympathetic but not lachrymose." Thirty-eight states were represented at this gathering.
