INDIANS MAKE GREAT STRIDES IN GENERATION OF PROGRESS

Any one visiting the Yuma Indian fair, now open at Ft. Yuma, will find it extremely and intensely interesting, and a view of the exhibits is indeed astonishing to one who knew the Yumas when only a generation back the dress of the women was bark skirts and the men were clad only in G-strings—while the children were not clad at all—when the only agriculture in Yuma valley was by planting on overflowed ground after the water had receded and the food of the Indians was largely mesquit beans.

In the large hall of one of the big school buildings, there is to be seen a splendid display of products from the reservation farms and beautiful specimens of Indian handicraft. There are spread upon the tables grand specimens of corn, pumpkins, beans, wheat, milo maize, cotton, and other products of the field that equal specimens of the same products grown anywhere on earth, and on other tables there are articles of clothing and fancy needlework by the girls of the school that would do credit to sewing classes in New England.

There, too, are tables, chairs and other furniture, shining with beautiful polish; and conspicuous among these is a rustic chair made by one of the boys from willow poles, with the bark still on.

The kitchen also furnishes evidence of the value of the white man's—or, rather, the white woman's—instruction, and one's mouth will water at the sight of the delicious bread, pastry, preserves and other delicacies too numerous to mention.

The Indians themselves are taking great pride in the display, and young and old they are continually passing and repassing through the hall, viewing the different exhibits, and pointing out to one and another the work of this and that son and daughter, and the white visitor readily notes the expression of gratification on the dusky faces of the favorable comment on the various exhibits.

The management of the reservation affairs and the teachers of the various departments surely deserve great credit for the work done under their superintendence, and visitors will find some of them always in attendance to facilitate inspection and point out the special merits.

This is the first fair ever held on the Yuma Indian reservation. Hereafter these events will be held annually.

YUMA CO. SCHOOLS EXHIBIT AT THE FAIR

The Yuma county rural school exhibit of drawing, construction work, sewing and language work made a very creditable showing at the State Fair. The work was mounted in the office of the county superintendent by Miss Greenleaf and sent to the educational department of the State Fair prior to the opening date. Miss Boehringer had arranged for Miss Isabel Corey and Miss Vivian Gregory—two of our Yuma girls at the Temperance normal school—to place the exhibit in the Yuma county booth. These young ladies gave the matter careful attention and a pleasing arrangement was the result. The work of the boys and girls of our rural schools caused much favorable comment.

A picture has been made of the exhibit. The picture and the work itself will be a part of the county exhibit to be arranged in connection with the county institute to be held in Yuma January 3, 4 and 5. During the institute the Yuma grammar schools and the Union high school will have some excellent exhibits.

Mr. McGraw and the Yuma city teachers and pupils have reason to feel much elated over their writing exhibit at the State Fair. This work was entered for premiums and they carried off six of the blue ribbons (six first premiums). The real competition in this work was between Yuma and Glendale. Glendale carried off the second where Yuma took first. But Glendale says they will give Yuma a real race next year. We look for Yuma to take every blue ribbon next year if they keep up their good work.

Yuma county will show the finest exhibit of work—good, regular every-day school work—at the county institute in January, the best that has ever been shown in Yuma. Parents and friends of the schools should plan to see this work.
