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CALLS MEXICANS TO NATIVE COUNTRY

Eliseo Arredondo, ambassador of the defacto Mexican government to Washington, is calling upon citizens of his country in cities of the Southwest to return to their country as a measure of safety in view of the strained relations between Carranza and this country.

This makes it look as if there would be a scrap, although it is only what the administration at Washington has been telling American citizens in Mexico for the past several years.

As a call to strictly Mexican citizens it is a matter of ordinary diplomatic procedure and nobody should feel bad about it. The call might as well be heeded also, however, by any Spanish-American hyphenates who are not satisfied with life in the good old U. S. A., as it is lived. We believe that there are few such.

WILSON IS GUILTY

It is charged by the German-American propagandists that President Wilson is a nativist, says the Tucson Star. It is useless for Democrats or Americans to deny it.

They had best meet the issue bravely, urge any plausible explanations which they may and throw themselves on the mercy of the country. In bringing this charge the German-Americans have found the president's most vulnerable spot. There is documentary evidence to support the charge, so it will be seen that Democrats, and Americans, would be wasting time and exposing themselves to foreign ridicule if they sought to disprove the charge.

A nativist, it appears, is an American who believes in American institutions and who prefers them frankly to the kultur of any foreign nation. He gives his allegiance to no country except America. He insists that a citizen cannot be loyal to America if he does not hold that the interests of America are first to be considered. He believes that Americans are entitled to exercise rights which are accorded them by the law of nations.

Wilson stands convicted of all these things. The case of the German-Americans is complete. Not only is he a nativist, but he is an anti-hyphenate, so it will be seen that his crime has been deliberate.

It is true, however, that there are extenuating circumstances. For instance, he was born in the United

States, so his offensive political beliefs might be said to be the product of environment, of example.

Perhaps he was deluded by reading the history of the United States, showing that patriots, or nativists, preferred death, chains and slavery to foreign domination and took the hazard with enthusiasm.

Perhaps he was carried away by the fatuous speech of Patrick Henry.

At any rate, it must appear to fair-minded men that the president, under the circumstances, is entitled to a trial before the jury of the American public.

CARRANZA IS A ROUND PEG IN A SQUARE HOLE

General Carranza has trifled over-long with a matter which he is not big enough to understand or to manage and now he finds himself confronted with the ultimate aspect of it and he must decide for the generations of Mexicans. If he makes war upon the United States he will rob that European monarch of the title of "The Biggest Fool in Christendom." Unfortunately, his previous actions do not give assurance that he is not deliberately a candidate for the honor.

The regret is that he has placed himself in the position where he must answer for all Mexico. It is criminal that he and his subordinates have told the people of Mexico that Americans are cowards, that England has already protested against American intervention in Mexico and that Latin-America will stand with Carranza.

Mexico has been dieted on lies for a conflict that can mean only the deepest humiliation for Mexico. For Carranza it will mean loss of position and prestige for if war comes it will not be Carranza that will emerge the chief among the chiefs. War will only reveal his utter incapacity for position and leave him shorn of every peacock feather which has been his principal appeal to Mexicans. However, Carranza is only an incident.
