He Met the Czar.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 5.—The Czar to-day granted an audience to Judge Lambert Tree, United States Minister, who presented his credentials.

Removed for Cause.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—The President has directed the removal of Alfred E. Lewis, Deputy Fifth Auditor of the Treasury, for neglect and inattention to his official duties.

A Foreign Blaze.

LONDON, Jan. 5.—A dispatch from Cochín, British India, states that the place is almost entirely destroyed by a fire which originated in a cocoa nut oil factory. Loss, \$1,500,000.

Accepts the Challenge.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—This morning Arthur Lumley received a telegram from John L. Sullivan, which stated he would leave to-night for Toronto to meet Kilrain and sign papers for the proposed fight for the world's championship.

No Quorum.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Reed, of Maine, called up his resolution to abolish for the remainder of the session the call of States for the first and third Mondays of each month. On ordering the previous question the vote stood yeas 98, nays 20—no quorum. A call of the House was ordered.

He is not Dead.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The leading topic among brokers and business men down town, is the great expose of the late Prof. Friends electric sugar refining company. It is now hinted that Friends is not dead at all, and that there has not been any body found so far, or any one who has seen his corpse. His death is said to have occurred two days before the blizzard last March.

A Robber Felled.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 5.—An attempt was made to rob the railroad ticket office here early this morning. A robber appeared at a narrow window and ordered the night operator, Van Anker, to throw up his "dukes." Van Anker immediately fired at the robber and the shot was returned, but neither took effect. Van Anker fired again, and it is believed struck the robber, though the latter escaped with two other men with him. Ten suspicious characters were arrested this morning.

More Blame.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Edmunds offered two resolutions, which were agreed to, calling on the President for information as to Venezuelan awards, and what steps, if any, had been taken by the United States government to collect the monthly quarter of Caracas customs receipts. Quiet and indolence

with some badinage followed. Springer introduced a joint resolution proposing a constitutional amendment authorizing Congress to make a uniform law of marriage and divorce; referred. Springer moved that the resolution be adopted directing the sergeant-at-arms to telegraph absent members requesting them to return on Monday; carried. Adjourned.

Dimmig Acquitted.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 5.—The second trial of John A. Dimmig was concluded this afternoon, and the jury, after deliberating nearly twenty-four hours, rendered a verdict of acquittal. Dimmig was charged with the murder of Henry Benhayon, whose death caused such a sensation here over a year ago owing to certain letters found at the time, and which purported to be a confession on the part of Benhayon that he had caused the death of Cecilia Brown several years previous, and that the dead had at last driven him to take his own life.

A Gigantic Swindle.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The Evening Sun prints what it calls an almost incredible tale of a gigantic fraud by which the Electric Sugar Refinery Company has been duped to the extent of over a million dollars. One Henry C. Friend, appeared in trade four years ago, with samples of wonderfully pure sugar which he said had been refined by a secret electric process. He induced a number of capitalists to organize a company, and buy the process from him. Factories were erected but no one was allowed inside of them but his wife and a few ignorant workmen. In the meantime the stock of the company had been bouncing up until it was worth nearly \$300 per share of \$100 par value. Friend then began to unload, but suddenly died. Ten days ago Mrs. Friend and all who had been connected with the factory disappeared. Officers of the company entered a secret chamber and found no sugar refined there at all; merely a number of machines used in breaking cube sugar into smaller particles. It was discovered that quantities of refined sugar, chiefly cubes, had been prepared in some secret spot with chemical liquid, which eliminated all ordinary impurities found in all sugars. Treasurer Robertson said, "It means ruin to us." There is no prospect of being able to save anything out of the wreck.

Senate.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—In the Senate Sherman called up the joint resolution reported yesterday, from the committee on foreign resolutions, declaring the sense of Congress in relation to the connection of European governments with any inter-ocean canal. A brief but interesting discussion ensued. Sherman said the resolution was but a reassertion of the Monroe doctrine. Teller said the only objection he had to the resolution was it should have been adopted years ago when the construction of the Panama canal was begun. West suggested that while favoring the resolution it was intended to have some bearing in favor of the Nicaragua canal scheme, to which he was opposed. Edmunds, the author of the resolution, disclaimed he had been influenced by such an idea. Call opposed the resolution as calculated to obstruct the great work of beneficence to mankind. Regan thought the resolution should not be pressed to a vote to-day, but considered and debated. Morgan took the view that Congress had no right to trammel the diplomatic action of the executive by the passage of this joint resolution. Sherman treated the objection to the form of the resolution, in being concurrent instead of a joint resolution, although he thought the latter the better form as hindering three branches of the govern-

ment. He would like to see all nations of the world, but not governments, co-operate in the work of building the Panama canal. After further discussion the resolution went over until Monday, and the tariff bill was taken up.
