A Scalper.

The lion scalps bring him \$15 each and the coyotes fifty cents each. He sent in four more of the latter to-day. At this rate the increase will not be worth branding next round-up in Cochise county.

Silver.

The following is the report on the silver market in San Francisco for the week ending February 16:

The market strengthened the past week with sales made up to 93c for shipment by the last steamer to China but at the close buyers are bidding only 92c, owing to the London market coming through at 42 1/2, with a weak tendency. Our market is very sensitive, due to the light output of the mines, chiefly in the Comstock district, where there is a small supply of water. Last month's report of Con. Virginia gives an increase in the percentage of gold. But the other mines in that district report about the usual percentage of gold.

The steamer that sailed for China on February 13th took out the following: To Hong Kong, Mexican dollars \$208,615; silver bullion \$68,000; to Bombay, silver bullion \$311,000. The market was well cleaned up by these shipments, but since then a few consignments have been received.

NOGAL CE NUTS.

The mill of Col. Royce at Arivaca started up Monday last to test the Yellow Jacket gold ores and the silver ores of the San Francisco in the Noon district.

Tol Driscoll and Chas. Bergen have made a strike which appears to be a good one both as to size and quantity, but no assays have been made. This find is about a quarter of a mile north of the line in Owens Canyon.

Messrs. Howard and Leeson have struck a lead of about one inch in thickness that assays 22,000 ounces. They have just made this strike and do not know how much ore they have but there is reason to believe that the vein will increase in width as it goes down. This claim adjoins the Nevada.

Messrs. Scott and Velasco came in Wednesday from the Planchas de Plata. On the same day two cars of machinery arrived from Denver for these mines. Another rich strike has been made in the Planchas de Plata, establishing beyond all question the great value of this property.

Another remarkable find has been made in this camp. The ledge is said to be eight feet wide and crops boldly from the ground. The place where it was found has been prospected over and over again but was covered with moss and was not discovered till recently. The ore assays in the neighborhood of 100 ounces.—Herald.

A Dying Bill.

From present indications a large majority of the Territory is strongly opposed to the passage of the circuit court bill now before the Legislature.

The citizens of Gila county have called a meeting to take measures for the defeat of the bill. Thus far the Phenix Gazette has been the only earnest advocate of the bill, and that being the Governor's organ is supposed to voice his wishes in the premises.

As it is understood that the Governor will veto the bill, if it does not confer upon him the power to appoint the judges and the clerks, it is quite safe to predict that the circuit court bill will not become a law during the present Legislature.—Citizen.

A Sad Duty.

Two young boys, aged respectively 10 and 12 years, named Hempsteth, were brought before Judge Easton today and a charge preferred against them of burglary. Their occupation is pilfering and they at last became so bold and audacious that it was found necessary to put a stop to it by legal process. One of the brothers cried when brought before the Judge, but the other one was as stolid as a wax figure. Their latest exploit was entering the Girard mill and carrying off everything they could lay their hands on. They were detected by the watchman yesterday while carrying off the clock. They gained an entrance by cutting a hole through an inch board with a knife and raising the latch on the inside opened the door. They also made themselves unpopular around the court house, carrying off inkstands, penholders, etc. Every method has been resorted to to reform them but of no avail. It is a sad case, and which is not a pleasant one for the Justice to handle. Their case will be disposed of in a day or two.
