Mr. Bryan and the Populist Convention.

### HIS ACCEPTANCE CONDITIONAL

Wm. P. St. John for National Treasurer—\$1,000,000 Loss by Flood.

### DEATH FROM DRINKING.

General Happenings Throughout the Country.

### ST. LOUIS—Wm. P. St. John has been appointed treasurer of the National Democratic committee.

LINCOLN—William J. Bryan told a United Press reporter tonight his action with regard to the Populist National ticket depended entirely on conditions attached to the nomination.

In answer to a question concerning the matter he said: "When the Populists decided to nominate the vice-president first, Senator Jones, chairman of the national Democratic committee, wired me as follows: 'St. Louis—To W. J. Bryan, Lincoln, Neb.—The Populists have decided to nominate a vice-president first. If it is not Sewall what shall we do? I favor your declaration in that event.' Signed, J. K. JENKS."

I wired immediately as follows: "Lincoln—I agree with you fully. If Sewall is not nominated, have my name withdrawn. Signed, W. J. BRYAN."

These dispatches were published in the morning papers and the convention understood my position. In spite of this they have seen fit to nominate me. Whether I shall accept the nomination or not depends entirely upon what conditions are attached to it."

PITTSBURG—The greatest of all floods in the Monongahela valley which is sweeping down that stream will cause the rivers here to reach a stage of 22 feet this evening which will be sufficient to flood the lower district of both cities. The general conditions throughout the valley is critical. The loss will reach over \$1,000,000.

SAN FRANCISCO—The police have been investigating the death of Albert Stetson, son of J. B. Stetson the millionaire, have come to the positive conclusion that there is no ground for suspicion of murder. They are satisfied that Stetson shot himself while crazed from excessive absinthe drinking.
