Hail Does Much Damage in the East.

GREAT LOSS OF CROPS.

A Railroad Man Shot—Great Excitement in Spain—The Silver Party.

BIG SHIPMENTS OF GRAIN.

General Happenings Throughout the Country.

MITCHELL, S. D.—A hail storm struck Jerrand county Sunday evening destroying 300,000 bushels of grain. Heavy wind also damaged buildings.

MADRID.—It is announced here that the ship builders of Genoa have repudiated the contracts with their representatives made with the Spanish government to furnish promptly two cruisers of 7,300 tons. Great excitement prevails here as it is added that these vessels have been purchased by the United States.

NEW YORK.—William P. St. John, treasurer of the national silver party, returned today from the St. Louis convention. He said:

"The national silver party has accepted the invitation from Baltimore merchants to notify Bryan and Sewall in the city of Baltimore. The notification will be made about fourteen days after the democratic notification in New York.

OHLEND, Cal.—Captain Bailey Tucker, general manager of the Travers, Atlantic & Gulf railway, was shot last night by Alfred St. Clair Abrams, prosecuting attorney for Lake county. Physicians say Tucker may recover. Abrams was lately anti-railroad candidate for the legislature in Lake county. He was defeated and charged that Tucker brought it about by unfair means.

KANSAS CITY, Mo.—Several western railroads are being pressed to provide facilities for the movement of last year's corn and small grain crop, which is coming into the market at a rapid rate. Sunday the Santa Fe sent west eleven trains of empty corn and grain cars and at the Argentine yards orders have been received for 270 more grain cars. The men in the Argentine shops were notified today that they would begin at once to work six full days a week. Many extra trainmen are getting employment.

OMAHA, Neb.—A special to the Bee from Yankton, S. D. says:

The destruction of crops, live stock and farm property in this country by hail last night is now estimated to amount to \$100,000. The devastated district covers an area of fifty square miles, extended from the village of

Lesterville to the town of Votin and four miles north of Yankton. The hailstones measured two to four inches in diameter and fell with such force as to kill young cattle, pigs and chickens. Cornfields were entire y stripped.
