IRRIGATION PROMOTOR.

A Visit From a Prominent Man—Silver Views.

Major Brummel one of the moving spirits in the Calabasas Irrigation Land and Water Company Enterprise recently incorporated at Nogales for \$3,000,000, the objects of which is to sink artesian wells acquire real-estate construct reservoir ditches, canals etc and propose to reclaim and irrigate the great Santa Cruz valley an account of which recently appeared in the PROSPECTOR was a visitor to Tombstone yesterday. The Major has interested himself in other Arizona irrigation undertakings and believes this country when more fully developed and its vast arid land made to bloom the rose with the application of water, her wonderful possibilities in that line already gradually receiving attention, Arizona will blossom out as the paradise of the west.

Cochise county presents some rare opportunities for irrigation and storage enterprises and the Major may be induced to inquire and investigate into their merits and interest himself.

Mr. Brummel is a staunch Republican but withal a silver advocate. He has given the question deep thought and reflection and offers a solution which he believes if it were thoroughly understood would be generally adopted. It is the establishment of state banks and by depositing bullion with the government and receiving in exchange certificates, notes, or government value to secure the deposit would thus insure or force free coinage besides furnishing a revenue for the government which would meet with the protectionist idea.

The Major left this morning for Globe on business matters but a return here and a look over the field can be looked for in the near future.

The building boom has struck the section around Dragoon. No less than seven houses, finished and under way; three at Russellville; also Dave and Wilber Adams, Wm. Four and James Four are erecting houses on their ranches.

Should the Nogales bank robbers, who are pursued by Sheriff Fly's posse, cross the line into Mexico their capture is a foregone conclusion. The Mexican line riders are only permitted to chase smugglers, but as the robbers would rob in true smuggling style, if at all, they would thus court their pursuit also. In Mexico the conditions are entirely different and each line rider knowing the country like a book besides being aided by the posse, short work will be made of the capture. However as the robbers are all bold and fearless men, crack shots and take no chances, a fight will undoubtedly result in bloodshed.

Two detachments of cavalry stopped at Dragoon Summit on their way to Nogales. Lieut. Sewell, 7th cavalry, August 14th, with 32 men and 44 animals; Captain McCormick of the 7th cavalry, with 26 men and 38 animals, arrived August 15th, remaining until noon of the 17th, when he returned with his command to Fort Grant. Both commands made the march from Grant to Dragoon without a stop.

A STATEMENT.

All Candidates Must File an Account of Expenditures.

For the benefit of those who intend to come before the public this fall we print the following, which is section 6 of a law passed by the 18th legislature entitled: "An Act in Relation to Elections and Crimes and Offenses Against the Elective Franchise."

"Every candidate who is voted for at any public election held within this territory shall, within thirty days after such election, file as hereinafter provided, an itemized statement showing, in detail, all the moneys contributed or expended by him, directly or indirectly, by himself or through any other person, in aid of his election. Such statements shall give the names of the various persons who received such money, the specific nature of each item, and the purpose for which it was expended or contributed. There shall be attached to such statement an affidavit, subscribed and sworn to by such candidate, setting forth, in substance, that the statement thus made is in all respects true, and that the same is a full and detailed statement of all moneys so contributed by him, directly or indirectly, by himself, or through any other person, in aid of his election. Candidates for office to be filled by the electors of the entire territory, or any division or district thereof greater than a county, and candidates for either house of the legislative assembly, and for district judge and for district attorney, shall file their statements with the office of the Secretary of the Territory; and candidates for town and city offices shall file their statements in the office of the town or city clerk, respectively, and candidates for county offices and for any other offices not otherwise above expressly provided for, shall file their statements with the clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the county wherein such election occurs. Within thirty days after each election, the chairman and secretary of the territory, county and city central committees of each and every political party presenting candidates, shall make and file a statement, under oath, setting forth in detail, all sums of money received, from whom received, and to whom and for what purpose such money was paid by such committees during the preceding election. Certificates of territorial chairman or secretaries shall be filed with the Secretary of the Territory, and for the county chairman and secretaries with the clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the county, and by city chairman and secretaries with the city clerk, which certificates shall be preserved by the officers with whom they are filed until the next general election, and shall be open to the inspection of the public. Any person or persons who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor."

Other sections of the act defines what shall not be done by candidates seeking office by the votes of the people, and among other things, it prohibits treating voters with intoxicating liquors, or promising appointment to place in the event of election, and all violations of the act are punished as misdemeanors.

ARTESIAN WELLS.

Twelve Now Flowing Near St. David.

P. A. Lofgreen was up yesterday from St. David and reports his section thriving and everyone enthusiastic over the success of the artesian wells sunk thereabouts.

During the past week Probate Judge Cliff of Graham county and Editor John Bordino of the Safford Guardian were visitors for a few days and were much pleased and delighted with the sight of flowing artesian wells in Arizona. Mr. Lofgreen states that P. B. Sabin has sunk another well on his place making four, and struck a flow fully equal of his first one and not in the least affecting the flow of the others thereabouts. It is easy boring for water, 75 to 80 feet per day being made. Twelve wells are now flowing. Several of the settlement are making arrangements to sink wells and soon this section will be the objective point for visitors from all sections to see the refreshing sight of these fountains of nature.

Mr. Lofgreen also intends sinking on his place and was in town today to secure piping etc. His well will be the largest now there. It will be an 8 inch pipe casing and expects to strike water within 250 feet.

Cochise is the only county in the territory that possesses artesian wells and this fact is drawing considerable attention to the county that also ranks as the banner mining and cattle county in the territory.

Referring to the situation about Nogales and across the line the Vi ette says: "On the Mexican side Lieutenant Colonel Kosterlitzki has 80 men in the field; 100 cavalry and 80 infantry. Fifty cavalry are scouting the country east and west. He has had official notification that his men have found tracks of twenty-three Indians all of whom have crossed the line into the United States. Ten crossed the line about seven miles west of Nogales and the remainder about nine miles east. A detachment of his men will remain permanently in Nogales."
