IN LINE OF DUTY.

THE END.

Robson's Body Arrives at Mesa and is Buried.

The Phoenix Herald has the following of the arrival of the remains of Frank Robson at Mesa, where they were interred:

"Messrs. A. W. Babbitt and W. E. Pomeroy of Mesa returned this morning with the remains of Frank Robson, recently killed by the Nogales bank robbers, in Skeleton Canyon. They left Fairbank last Monday morning, traveled through Rucker canyon, finally securing the body, for which they made a rough box at a ranch some distance away, and returning arrived in Bisbee Wednesday morning at 7 o'clock. The distance is usually estimated at 90 miles, or 180 miles both ways, but the necessity of wagon travel took them even further than that.

"The killing took place in a little gulch that enters Skeleton Canyon, about 1 1/2 miles from the monument that marks the site of Geronimo's surrender to General Miles. It was learned that at the shooting the murderers were but 15 feet distant from their victim. Messrs. Babbitt and Pomeroy stated that the cowboys in that region were very kind to them, assisting them in every way possible.

"The identity of the robbers is known and two of the gang were seen at a distance, sending word to the boys that if they were not afraid of being ambushed by officers they would accompany them. They also expressed sympathy for the widow and said if she were in need of financial assistance she could have it liberally as they know Frank and liked him, his killing merely being a necessity of the occasion in their line of business. It seems to be a question of outlaw against officer, purely a matter of business in which personal enmity does not enter and in which it is unsafe for local residents on the range to take sides."
