San Pedro Round-up Association will commence work on September 10, beginning at the Wakefield place.



The Trouble in Turkey Again Manifest.

BODIES THROWN IN THE SEA

Li Hung Chang the Guest of the Nation—Bicycle vs Horse.

ASYLUM BURNED DOWN.

General Happenings Throughout the Country.

NAPA, Cal.—F. A. Cutter was nominated for congress today by the First district democratic convention. He will submit his nomination to a joint committee of democrats, populists and silverites.

CONSTANTINOPLE.—Scores of dead bodies have been thrown into the sea in order to save the trouble of burying them. The British charge d'affaires has refused the request of the Sultan to withdraw the guards of British marines, saying he cannot do so until the disorders here are thoroughly quelled. Of the Armenians seized in the Ottoman bank five were killed and five wounded. They all came from abroad. Fifteen survivors, have been sent to Marseilles, the British and French war ships seeing the Messagerie liner safely off.

New York.—Li Hung Chang arose early. His first caller was ex-Secretary John W. Foster. The report that the ambassador and the Russian minister had a conference last night was confirmed by Edward B. Drew, commissioner of customs in the Chinese service. He would say nothing as to what passed between his excellency and the minister. The program today was presented to Earl Li and by it he found that the great feature of the day was his reception by President Cleveland at the residence of William C. Whitney.

CHICAGO.—Joe Patsch, the champion pacing stallion, has been matched against W. W. Hamilton, the Denver bicyclist, who holds the most unpaced records, for a race at Rochester, N. Y. September 19, mile heats, best two in three, for a purse of \$2,000.

Pittsburg, Pa.—The coal miners at Anderson, Nottingham, Hackett and Germania of the Wheeling division have been notified of a reduction to 60 cents a ton on September 1. If the miners refuse to accept the cut the mines will close and 1,500 men will be thrown out of employment.

INDIANAPOLIS.—Credentialed of the various states and territories are being received and tabulated at gold democratic headquarters today. It is estimated that prizes will be low and that

practically every state and territory that has named delegates will be represented.

GREENWOOD Ia.—The state institute for feeble minded children burned yesterday morning involving a loss of \$150,000. All the inmates were rescued. The fire was caused by lightning. There were a hundred children in the building.

NEW YORK.—Shortly after the reception to Li Hung Chang, President Cleveland started for Buzzard's Bay on the yacht Sapphire.
