UNDER WHICH FLAG.

PEOPLES PARTY PLATFORM.

For President, W. J. BRYAN of Nebraska. For Vice-President, T. WATSON, Georgia.

We demand:

I. The free and unrestricted coinage of gold and silver at the present rate of 16 to 1 without regard to the actions or wishes of any nation or combination whatever.

II. The increase of the current money to an amount sufficient to meet the wants of our growing population and business, such money to consist of silver and gold.

III. The abolition of all national banks, and the establishment of Postal Saving Banks, managed and controlled by the U. S. Treasury.

IV. The establishment of a system of direct legislation by the people, giving to the people themselves the power, not to veto all laws passed by any less than 55 per cent of all their representatives, and to propose the enactment of laws, by a number greater than five per cent of the electors and compel their submission to the whole body of the electors.

V. That all means of transporting persons property and intelligence be gradually to be taken by an unpartisan commission under strict civil service rules.

VI. That all public salaries and compensations shall be made to correspond to the price of labor and labor's products.



Letter Carriers in Convention and Make Grevienies.

FROM ACROSS THE POND.

A Sensational Charge Against a Governor—A Big Law Suit in California.

A COMMITTEEMAN ALERT

General Happenings Throughout the Country.

GORLITZ.—After reviewing the troops today the emperor of Germany and the czar of Russia rode from the field at the head of the color company.

Emperor William was on the left of the czar and General Von Seeckt commanding the Fifth army corps, to which the troops reviewed belonged, was on his right. On arriving at the town hall the monarchs reigned up their horses in order to watch the color company and the standards of the quadron march past.

Their majesties and the Russian suite then dined at the town hall. The czar and czarinas started for Kiel this evening.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich.—At noon all the letter carriers delegation, except Chicago and Detroit, had arrived for the national convention. They were promptly on hand for the parade at 2:30. Twenty-five hundred marched in the procession. The chief subject of discussion is the proposal to petition that the salary in cities of the first class be made \$1,200 and in others \$1,000.

CHICAGO.—Hos. I. N. Stevens, who was about to start for Washington last night, was recalled by Chairman Jones and started for the west on urgent business of the national committee.

LOS ANGELES.—In the case of the United States Trust company of New York against the Atlantic & Pacific Railroad company and others for the failure of the first mortgage on the road, was set for hearing before Judge Ross for today but was postponed until tomorrow. The same questions that were argued and disposed of in this case in New Mexico and Arizona are to come before Judge Ross.

ST. PETERSBURG.—The Novoe Vremya makes the important statement today that the czar's tour shows that Berlin and Vienna as well as Paris and St. Petersburg are conscious of the necessity of common action by the powers to defeat the political designs of Great Britain, which, it is added, are clearly displayed in recent events in Turkey.

CHICAGO.—Governor Evans is accused of failing to give an itemized account of the charges against the dispendary law of \$150 for a trip to Wash-

ington. The governor says the expenditure was legitimate. Political wiseacres declare the disclosures will result in a total disruption of the reform faction. The election tomorrow will be extremely close.
