PEOPLES PARTY PLATFORM

For President, W. J. BRYAN, of Nebraska. For Vice-President, T. WATSON, of Georgia. We demand—

- I. The free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the present ratio of 16 to 1 without regard to the actions or wishes of any other nation or combination whatever. II. The increase of the current money to an amount sufficient to meet the wants of our growing population and business, such money to consist of silver and gold coin and U. S. Treasury notes, equally a legal tender for all demands public and private. III. The abolition of all national banks and the establishment of Postal Saving Banks, managed and controlled by the U. S. Treasury. IV. The establishment of a system of direct legislation by the people, giving to the people themselves the power, rat. To veto all laws passed by any less than 55 per cent of all their representatives, and to propose the enactment of laws by any number greater than five per cent of the electors and compel their submission to the whole body of the electors. V. That all means of transporting persons property and in intelligence be gradually taken by the Nation and conducted and controlled by an impartial commission under strict civil service rules. VI. That all public salaries and compensations shall be made to correspond to the price of labor and labor's product.

Republican Primaries

TOMBSTONE, September 19, 1896.

At a meeting of the Republican county central committee, held at the court house at Tombstone, Cochise county, on the above date, it was ordered that the 26th day of September, 1896, be and is hereby set as the day for holding the Republican primaries in this county, for the purpose of electing delegates to a Republican county convention to be held in the court house, in Tombstone, on the 8th day of October, 1896, at 10 o'clock, p. m., and there to nominate Territorial and County officers, and to transact such other business as may properly come before said convention.

Bryan Addresses a Meeting in North Carolina.

McKINLEY ALSO DISCOURSES

Shocking Death of a Young Girl—An Embezzler Goes to Jail.

NEW INSURANCE RATES.

CHARLOTTE, N. C.—Mr. Bryan addressed several thousand people here today. In concluding his remarks he said: "I am not surprised that the Republicans who eight years ago stood on the platform that denounced the Democratic party in its attempt to demonetize silver will join with us today in demanding bi-metallicism which had been the historic policy of the United States until 1873, and received the support of all statesmen, Republicans, Democrats, Whig and everything we ever had in this county."

CANTON, O.—Major McKinley today addressed a large delegation of employees of the Edgar Thomson Steel works, of Braddock, Pa. The theme of his discourse was the protection of American industries against the labor of the old world.

HEALSBURG, Cal.—Ida May, the 14-year-old daughter of J. J. Gobbi, met a shocking death in her father's winery in this city. In some way the little girl got caught in the steam crusher and was ground to death.

NEW YORK.—The records of the court of common pleas show that P. J. P. Tynan, the dynamite suspect under arrest at Boulogne-sur-Mer, has been a citizen of the United States since August 1888.

WASHINGTON.—The statement prepared at the mint bureau shows that silver coinage during the month of August aggregated \$2,650,000. This yielded to the government a profit on seigniorage of \$322,027.03.

LOOAN, O.—Lawrence A. Culver, a former banker, charged with embezzlement, was held under \$3,500 for his appearance on September 21. He could not secure bond and went to jail. He was captured on board a Vandalia train at Terre Hau's last Monday afternoon after being a fugitive for four years.

SAN FRANCISCO.—The new fire insurance company will meet this week to fix rates for the Pacific coast. The rates will undoubtedly be raised although it is considered unlikely that they will ever be so high as before the disastrous rate war which wiped out all profits for the companies.

VICTOR, Colo.—Dan McLeod and Frank Ledbetter were killed today by an explosion at the Independence mine. They drilled into a blast that had failed to go off.

HAVANA.—According to official re-

turns the number of men suffering from yellow fever in military hospitals throughout the island is 1,655. The death rate is said to be under fifteen per cent.
