PEOPLES PARTY PLATFORM

For President, W. J. BRYAN, of Nebraska. For Vice-President, T. WATSON, of Georgia. We demand:-

I. The free and unrestricted coinage of gold and silver at the present ratio of 16 to 1 without regard to the actions or wishes of any other nation or combination whatsoever.

II. The increase of the current money to an amount sufficient to meet the wants of our growing population and business, such money to consist of silver and gold coin and U. S. Treasury notes, equally a legal tender for all demands public and private.

III. The abolition of all national banks and the establishment of Postal Saving Banks, managed and controlled by the U. S. Treasury.

IV. The establishment of a system of direct legislation by the people, giving to the people themselves the power, 1st. To veto all laws passed by any number greater than five per cent of the electors and compel their submission to the whole body of the electors.

V. That all claims of transporting persons property and intelligence be gradually taken by the Nation and conducted and controlled by an impartial commission under strict civil service rules.

VI. That all public salaries and compensations shall be made to correspond to the price of labor and labor's product.

Republican Primaries

TOMBSTONE, September 20, 1896.

At a meeting of the Republican county central committee, held at the court house, Tombstone, Cochise county, on the above date, it was ordered that the 26th day of September, 1896, be, and it hereby is set as the day for holding the Republican primaries in this county, for the purpose of electing delegates to a Republican county convention, to be held in the court house, in Tombstone, on the 8th day of October, 1896, at 2 o'clock p. m., then and there to nominate Territorial and County officers, and to transact such other business as may properly come before said convention.

Bryan Writes A Letter to German-Americans.

MILES COMING TO ARIZONA.

A Defaulter's Shortage Increasing-Corbett Arrested-Identified.

MR. BRYAN AT LOWELL.

CHICAGO.-The German-American Bryan and Altgeld club has received a letter from William J. Bryan in answer to an address of a delegation of club members laid before him at St. Louis Sept. 12. In this address they assured him of their support. The letter is dated Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 23, and in part is as follows:

"The Bryan and Altgeld club of Cook county: I am in receipt of your address assuring me of your support to this presidential contest, and I beg to express to you individually and collectively my appreciation of your friendly interest. My confidence in the good judgment of our German-Americans leads me to believe that they will be found among the staunchest supporters of bimetalism and my faith in their patriotism makes me certain that they will favor an independent financial policy for the United States.

"I have been much gratified to notice the rapid growth of the silver sentiment among the German speaking portion of our citizens. If the gold standard has been a blessing to Germany, Prince Bismarck certainly would not desire his country to abandon the gold standard and restore bimetalism. It is humiliating to think that American citizens doubt the ability of the United States to legislate for itself when a statesman like Bismarck is willing to concede to the United States the ability to lead in the restoration of bimetalism. The testimony given by Bismarck as to the failure of a gold standard to benefit Germany is likewise true of every nation which has tried gold standard."

SAN FRANCISCO.-Major General Nelson A. Miles, commander-in-chief of the army and party arrived here today. He will remain here until Monday and then leave for southern California and Arizona on his inspection of western military posts.

NEW YORK.-James J. Corbett, indicted two weeks ago for arranging a match with Fitzsimmons, came to the city from Aebury Park Saturday and gave bonds for his appearance for trial.

OMAHA, Neb.-The City of Omaha today filed suit against the bondsmen of the defaulting city treasurer, Bollen for \$85,000. This is the shortage during his first term. The balance brings the total of Bollen's stealings to \$115,000. The bondsmen offered to settle for \$18,000.

NAPA, Cal.-William Moore, murderer of Mrs. Greenwood has been positively identified by Patrick Lynch, for a year and a half also by John Bush a fellow laborer on the Lynch ranch.

NATHUA, N. H.-The endeavor of New Englanders to make amends for the reception given Bryan at New Haven was illustrated when the train pulled into Lowell at 9:15 this morning. The depot platform was a crowded howling mass of humanity. The train stopped five minutes. It was the intention of Bryan to speak but he had no opportunity. The train shed was lined with crowds for blocks and they shouted and cheered as they caught sight of Bryan and Sewall. They bawled played "Hail to the Chief."
