PEOPLES PARTY PLATFORM For President, W. J. BRYAN, of Nebraska. For Vice-President, T. WATSON, of Georgia. For Delegate to Congress, BUCKY O'NEILL. I. The free and unrestricted coinage of gold and silver at the present ratio of 16 to 1 without regard to the actions or wishes of any other nation or combination whatever. II. The increase of the current money to an amount sufficient to meet the wants of our growing population and business, such money to consist of silver and gold coins and U. S. Treasury notes, equally a legal tender for all demands public and private. III. The abolition of all national banks and the establishment of Postal Saving Banks, managed and controlled by the U. S. Treasury. IV. The establishment of a system of direct legislation by the people, giving to the people themselves the power, 1st. To veto all laws passed by any number greater than five per cent of the electors and compel their submission to the whole body of the electors. V. That all means of transporting persons and property and intelligence be gradually taken by the Nation and conducted and controlled by an unpartisan commission under strict civil service rules. VI. That all public salaries and compensations shall be made to correspond to the price of labor and labor's product.

AUGUSTA, Ga.—The election in Georgia was a great surprise. Fusion develops great strength. Atkinson, the present governor, ran twenty per cent behind his ticket. His majority will barely be 10,000. The A. P. A. are beaten in Savannah. The country counties are reported as voting strongly for Wright, the Prohibition-Populist candidate.

ATLANTA, Ga.—Thirty-two counties give an estimated Democratic gain of 3,666. Chairman of the state Democratic executive committee, Mr. A. C. Clay, says: "We have carried the state by between 35,000 and 40,000 majority."

JACKSONVILLE, Fla.—Returns from yesterday's election continue to come in slowly. Up to 7 o'clock this evening complete figures have been received from only five of the forty-five counties. These give Bluzome (Dem.) for governor, 6,026; Gunley, (Rep) 1,378; Weeks, (Pop.) 665.

NEW YORK.—William J. Koerner, a newspaper artist formerly of Pittsburgh, was today held without bail on recommendation of a coroner's jury on the charge of murdering Rose A. Redgate whom he shot in the street in this city on Sept. 22.
