The Democratic party of Cochise county, Arizona, in convention assembled, hereby reaffirm our belief in and allegiance to the time honored principles of Democracy, and do unqualifiedly endorse the Democratic National Platform adopted in Chicago, and Democratic territorial platform as adopted at Williams, and the national and territorial tickets, and we congratulate the people that after the most strenuous attempts to subvert those traditions and principles, by those high in power and in the interests of the money lenders of Europe, the Democratic party has risen in its might and cast out such traitors and has forced them into the party of plutocracy, corporations, and assassins of labor headed by Mark Hanna and his gang, where they properly belong, and where they are receiving the hearty support and co-operation of every monopoly and corruptor in our country.

We congratulate ourselves and the whole people that every industrial society and all parties which sincerely believe in our government returning to the money of our fathers and the constitution, are with us today in this mighty struggle for the emancipation of sixty millions of white slaves from the corrupting influences of gold monometalism, and that there is every reason to believe from the signs of the times, that the machinery of this government will again soon be placed in the hands of the people.

The contraction of the currency, of our country, by the demonetization of silver was the most gigantic and heinous crime ever perpetrated on any people in the history of the whole world; and those responsible for it are traitors to freedom and Republican institutions, and those who would now seek to maintain the present miserable condition of our own people by the maintenance of the present gold standard when the present opportunity is offered in an expansion of currency for the alleviation of the sufferings of humanity, are parties to that great crime, in sympathy with the influence which seeks to establish on the ruins of our government a plutocracy; or, they deceived and misled by the glittering falsehoods circulated by the enemies of the people—the money changers of the east.

A People's Victory Certain By Bryans Election.

A RELIABLE ESTIMATE.

College Hoodlums Throw Eggs—Miners Resume Work—Bryan's Address.

A MOST REVOLTING CRIME

CHICAGO.—Chairman Campau of the Democratic National committee, received today telegraphic reports from each chairman in the union giving estimates based on the latest information as to how the different states would record their votes one week from Tuesday. This is the last formal report that will be made by the chairmen of the different state committees.

Mr. Campau said: The Democratic National committee awaits the result of next week's election with serene confidence. William J. Bryan will be elected by the largest popular majority given any president in a quarter of a century. He will have more than 300 votes in the electoral college.

CHICAGO.—Eggs were thrown at the Bryan parade this afternoon by the students of the Metropolitan Business College. Two men are under arrest.

ATHENS, O.—All coal miners in this district went to work today at a 45 cent rate with the expectation that a 61 cent rate will soon be restored.

JOLIET, Ill.—In the public square at Pontiac were gathered thousands of people to hear Mr. Bryan today. Numerous McKinley badges were seen in the crowd but every sentence of Mr. Bryan's address was punctuated with applause. Arguments were of the same general character as those used by him daily. The citizens of Dwight were addressed for five minutes and a speech was made at Braidwood where an immense audience of miners cheered the candidates. At Joliet were many gold badges in the crowd. Mr. Bryan devoted his speech to the discussion of the money question as it applied particularly to the working classes. Addresses were also made at Lemont and Willow Springs.

RICHMOND, Mo.—Mrs. Eva Winner, wife of Jesse Winner and her two children a girl aged 3, and boy aged eighteen months, were murdered last night. The woman's head was cut off with an axe, and the throats of the children cut and the spinal cords severed. Bloodhounds are being used to track the murderer.

Election Proclamation

OFFICE OF THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF TOMBSTONE, ARIZONA TERRITORY.
To Whom It May Concern, Greeting:

Whereas, Under an act of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Arizona, entitled "Elections," approved March 28th, A. D. 1887, and in compliance with Section 4, Article 8 of the City Charter, a general municipal election is to be held on the 3rd day of November for the purpose of electing city officers.

Now, therefore, I, Paul B. Warrickson, Mayor of the City of Tombstone, in pursuance of the duty imposed upon me by a resolution duly passed and entered upon the minutes of the Common Council of said city, do hereby order a general municipal election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1896, and designate the offices to be filled as follows, to-wit:

1—Mayor.
2—Councilman from First Ward.
3—Councilman from Second Ward.
4—Councilman from Third Ward.
5—Councilman from Fourth Ward.
6—Chief of Police, Ex-Officio City Assessor, City Tax Collector, City License Tax Collector, Health Officer, Pound Master and Street Commissioner.
