UNDER WHICH FLAG?
 "We are unalterably opposed to the single gold standard. We demand the immediate resumption of the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for international agreement for the aid or consent of any other nation. We demand that the standard silver dollar shall be a full legal tender, equally with gold, for all debts, public or private, and we favor such legislation as will prevent the devaluation of the dollar, St. Louis, June 18, 1896."

An important issue of this campaign seems to be either the free and unlimited coinage of silver or the forced and unlimited printing of bonds.—Butte Miner.

There was a good audience at the hall last night to hear the candidates and to welcome "Our Mark" back in his old home, and to listen to his argumentative speech, by which he made many votes.

Under the pretense of a promise to secure free coinage of silver through international agreement, the territorial Republican candidate for congress asks the free silver voter for his suffrage.

The speech of "Our Mark" last night was one of the best oratorical efforts ever heard by a Tombstone audience. This is not said because of our leaning toward Coahque's favorite son but from expressions and comments made by the people who heard him, and regardless of party affiliations paid the glib leader the compliment which he so deservedly earned.

The following item from the Los Angeles Record of the 23d will give a good idea of the extent of the silver sentiment in southern California:

"The membership of the Silver Republican club this morning was 3,360. With accessions which come to the roll Saturday as the farmers come to town, it is expected that the roll will easily reach 4,000 tomorrow night. U. W. Mills, Secretary Cooper's assistant, has charge of the registration. Every applicant is asked: 'Are you a Democrat or Populist?' If he admits that he has voted with either of these parties at the last presidential election, he is given a general silver badge and his name is not placed on the roll. Every effort is being made to restrict the roll to Republicans who intend to vote for the silver principle."

Election Proclamation

To all whom it may concern—

WHEREAS under act of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Arizona, entitled "Elections" approved March 8, 1897, it is provided that elections be held throughout the Territory, upon the Tuesday after the first Monday in November A. D. 1898, and every two years thereafter, an election for members of the Legislative Assembly, and such other officers as may be required by law shall be chosen at such election.

AND WHEREAS it is further provided in said Act that at least thirty days before such general election the Governor shall issue an Election Proclamation, under the great seal of the Territory, and transmit copies thereof to the Clerks of the Board of Supervisors of the counties in which such elections are to be held. Such proclamation is to contain a statement of the time of the election, and the officers to be elected, and the office of a reward in the form prescribed by said act.

Now THEREFORE I, Benjamin Franklin, Governor of Arizona in pursuance of the duty enjoined upon me do hereby order a general election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November A. D. 1898, and the officers to be elected at such election to do hereby designate to be as follows to-wit:

One delegate to the 55th Congress of the United States.

Twenty-four members of the Council of the Legislative Assembly of Arizona.

Twenty-four members of the House of Representatives of the Legislative Assembly of Arizona.

And there shall be elected in each county of the territory: one Probate Judge; one District Attorney; one Sheriff; one Treasurer; one Recorder; one Surveyor; two members of the Board of Supervisors; except in the county of Navajo where there shall be elected three members of the Board of Supervisors; and in each of the counties where the office of Tax Collector has not been consolidated with the office of Sheriff or Treasurer, one Tax Collector shall be elected. Also in the several precincts of each county, one Justice of the Peace, one Constable, and in such precincts as are entitled to two Justices of the Peace and two Constables; that number shall be elected.

And I do hereby offer a reward of \$25 for the arrest and conviction of any and every person violating any of the provisions of title 4, part 2 of the Penal Code.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the Territory to be hereunto affixed this 26th day of September A. D. 1896.
