Mark at Nogales.

Nogales, Oct. 29, 1896. Ed. PROSPECTOR.—Tonight Nogales is all excitement again.

"OUR MARK'S" RECORD.

It is Unsurpassed by Any Other Delegate.

The following brief synopsis of the record of Marcus A. Smith has been hunted up by the Vidette and is taken from the Congressional Record:

"First, the Record shows that he introduced 215 different measures, in the way of bills introduced, amendments offered, petitions and memorials presented, all of which, with the exception of four, which were in favor of Utah, were for the benefit of Arizona, and he was on the floor of congress 71 different times making speeches in favor of those measures.

"Second, he passed the bill twice through the lower house admitting Arizona to statehood, which contained greater appropriations than those received by Dakota, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming or Utah, the territories mentioned in the open letter of Hon. Wm. O'Neill.

"Third, he passed a bill which gave to the territory twenty-five thousand dollars for the relief of the Peruvian land grant, through which this great fraud was defeated, \$300,000 for surveys alone, to give settlers an opportunity of proving up on their lands, \$100,000 to pay private Indian depredation claims, some of which were retained by people living in Pima Co. today; 2500 acres of land for a prison farm which, if properly managed, will make that institution self sustaining, thereby lifting a heavy annual burden from the people; \$10,000 for a levy on the Gila river, and \$5000 for the surveys of coal lands.

"When Arizona is admitted to statehood, under the bill provided by Mr. Smith, then will his work in the appropriation of lands and lands for the upbuilding of Arizona be fully recognized and we will be one of the great prosperous states in the union."

The People's Party of Cochise county in convention assembled this 1st day of October, 1896 make the following declarations of principles:

- 1. We approve and endorse the platform of the National People's Party adopted at St. Louis on July 23rd 1896 and most heartily endorse the nomination, by the convention, of W. J. Bryan and Thomas E. Watson for president and vice-president respectively, and fully approve the action of the convention in refusing to endorse the nomination of Arthur Sewall for vice-president by the Chicago convention. 2. We heartily approve the platform adopted by the People's Party of Arizona at Phoenix on August 20th 1896 and heartily endorse the nomination of Hon. Wm. O'Neil for delegate to congress and pledge to him our best efforts for his election. 3. We denounce as unfit to be trusted by the people, the men through whom, the private interest bearing debt of this county (about \$200,000) has been created and we particularly denounce the system of extortion, speculation, jobbery, corruption and bribery which with few exceptions has inhered on county offices for sixteen years, resulting in a necessary tax levy of \$4.25 on the hundred dollars notwithstanding that the people have every year paid more taxes than would be sufficient to govern a far larger and more populous county if honestly administered. 4. We have placed in nomination for county offices, men chosen from amongst the people, for the sole reason of our belief in their honesty, and fitness on the principle that the office should seek the man, carefully avoiding all men even remotely connected with former tax eating and county swindling. 5. If our candidates or any of them should be elected, we promise to watch them and use our best endeavors to see that they serve the people faithfully and honestly without extortion, fraud or oppression, and that they do not degenerate into county registers, and plundering officials, and if they should so degenerate we promise to be first to expose them. 6. We favor statehood for Arizona at the earliest possible date, but not under the constitution adopted by our so-called Democratic convention five years ago, as we believe it to be a boodler constitution, specially manufactured in the interests of bosses, ringsters and tax eaters, and we therefore earnestly urge our delegate to congress to introduce an enabling act, so that the people may form a constitution that will not be a disgrace to this, and a grievous burden to succeeding generations. 7. We condemn the practice of territorial and county officers, in soliciting or receiving, railroad passes, as we consider all such favors, as incompatible with independent and impartial performance of duty. 8. We invite the co-operation and assistance of all honest citizens regardless of party who favor an honest administration of county and territorial affairs in the interest of all the people.
