LOST AND DEMENTED.

Experience of a Wanderer in the San Simon.

Jack Clark, the unfortunate citizen who was brought over from San Simon as a patient for the hospital, indeed had a trying experience on the plains and it is almost incredible that he is alive to tell the tale.

Mr. Clark, who was a carpenter at Phoenix, finding employment hard to get at the capital city decided to return to his old home in the east. Not having the necessary collateral to pay for railroad fare he attempted to work his passage as freight beam tourist. All went well until a brakeman discovered him near Bisbee—the train was stopped and Clark put off.

Finding himself alone and nothing but a vast stretch of arid plain in each direction and no habitation in sight he trudged on foot over the countless miles until he noted in the dim distance what he thought was a ranch. Hungry and thirsty he made for the spot, but never reached it. Darkness overcame him and from sheer exhaustion he laid down to sleep. Next morning nothing but the dreary endless waste greeted his gaze, and to make matters worse he lost his bearings and was completely at sea as to which direction he came from. Weak from a gnawing hunger, and burning thirst he wandered about until he found a small seepage of water in a ravine which was a Gedsend. For food he declares nothing but acorns and oak buds could be found and that he subsisted entirely on that diet.

Repeatedly he made attempts to find the railroad and strained his eyes looking for a human being or something to give him hope, but in vain. He was driven half crazed through worry and weakness from lack of nourishment until each day was one of misery. When found by a number of cowboys who were on the round up in that section, Clark was nearly naked and looked like a wild man, although emaciated and harmless.

After receiving restoratives and food he told his story from the time he was put off the train until found; when told the date he had spent just one month and 20 days on the prairie and had only kept body and soul together with acorns and oak buds. His is a pitiable case and to restore his former health will require a long term of careful treatment and nourishment, which will be given him.

Up to date, in Prescott, there are 27 applications for the post office, 18 for each land office, six foreign consuls, principally to Mexico, four governors, as many secretaries, U. S. marshals and judges galore, four internal revenue collectors, one U. S. attorney, 14 collectors of customs at Nogales, and for the sake of modesty, but one member of McKinley's cabinet.—Journal Miner.

DISTRICT COURT.

Cases Heard Before that Tribunal Today.

Comacho vs. C. W. Blackburn—Submitted on briefs.

Partial report of jury and indictment found against W. S. Sessions, for rape and Chas. Wilkes, resisting an officer.

H. A. Morgan, trial juror excused.

Carr vs Carr—Decree of divorce granted.

Territory vs Geo. A. Williams—Charged with assault and attempt to commit murder. Case on trial as we go to press.

The merry-go-round which has been located near the PROSPECTOR office is to be taken into Mexico next week. A duty of \$300 will have to be paid to take the machine across the line.

The Republican says Mrs. Frank Robson of Mesa, wife of line rider who was killed in ambush in Skeleton canyon by the Nogales bank robbers has received a check for \$2,000 from the grand lodge of Workman, as the insurance on the life of her husband.

C. W. Blackburn is over from Bisbee and is greeted by his numerous Tombstone friends. Mr. Blackburn informs us that 10 men are employed now doing assessment work on the Copper King claims, the prospectus of which was recently published in the PROSPECTOR. He states a large amount of development work will be begun about January 1, a sufficient amount of money being in the treasury to guarantee operations on a large scale and work vigorously pushed. TARIFF REGULATIONS.

Of Mexico Pertaining to the Free Zone.

President Diaz, of Mexico, has just issued tariff regulations providing for the admission into the interior of Mexico, free of duty, agricultural products of the free zone. Heretofore the products of the free zone have to pay duty for admission into the interior the same as foreign goods, says the Mexican Herald. But under the new regulations the free zone agricultural products, in their native condition, will be admitted into the interior of Mexico free of duty; and manufactured products of the free zone can secure admission into the interior by special permit from the secretary of the treasury.

A request for such a permit must be applied for through the jefe politico or highest official of the precinct in which the goods to be shipped were produced. And in the case of agricultural products, shipped from the free zone into the interior, jefe politico at the point of shipment must testify to the fact that the goods are the products of the free zone.

In the case of manufactured goods being shipped from from the free zone into the interior of Mexico, the order for their admission must be countersigned by the postmaster or stamp agent of the district in which the goods were manufactured and a bond will be required as a guarantee that the goods were manufactured in the free zone.

The automatic machine idea has been turned to new account in Italy. Put a coin in the slot and take out a receipt and the thing is done. The workingman's "honest penny" is backed without the trouble of going to the savings bank or post office. When a sufficient number of receipts have been collected they can be exchanged for a "libretto" at the regular savings bank. Interest at 4 per cent is paid on deposit, and the depositors are entitled to a share of the profits derived from the bank's operations.

OUR BRANDY OUTPUT.

Almost Wholly Used to Fortify Sweet Wines.

Distilling is carried on in Arizona at two places, Mesa, Maricopa county, and Pima, Graham county. The former is a grape distillery and at the latter one fruit and one grain distillery, the last being the only whisky still in the southwest. The Phoenix Herald says: Distilling in Maricopa county is carried on mainly for the purpose supplying brandy for the fortification of sweet wines, the country in the past season producing of such wine 13,000 gallons. Outside of brandy used for this purpose only thirty-seven gallons have been reported to Deputy Internal Revenue Collector Osborn at the Phoenix office.

Brandy used in the making of wine is by law exempt from the ninety cent tax, so the Phoenix office derives for the government very little revenue on that score.

Claret, and ordinary light wines, requiring no fortification, are not interfered with by the government and no statistics are at hand as to the year's product of light wines in Maricopa county.

EXECUTIVE CLEMENCY.

Governor Franklin Pardons Two Prisoners.

A pardon has been issued from the governor's office for Samuel Engle, under sentence of two years from Pima county for grand larceny. The term would have expired soon and the pardon is given only for the purpose of restoring citizenship. The superintendent of the territorial prison has recommended the pardon of William Harper, sent from Prescott under a twenty-five year sentence for murder. A few years ago the sentence was commuted by Governor Hughes so that the term would expire February 4, 1896. He has been an exemplary prisoner and is considered well worthy of executive clemency.—Herald.
