CUBAN QUESTION ON TAP

Intense Interest Shown in the Senate—The All Absorbing Question.

FAVORABLE RESOLUTION

WASHINGTON—The senate was literally deluged for half an hour today with reports, resolutions and spirited colloquies on the Cuban question. Intense public interest on this question was shown by the largest crowd since the opening day of the session. The main event of the day was the presentation by Mr. Cameron of the report of the committee on foreign relations favorable to his resolution recognizing the independence of Cuba. This proceeding was brief and perfunctory, the report not being read and agreement speedily reached by which the resolution and report go over until after the holidays.

HEAVY FAILURE

An Old Bank of Chicago Closes Its Doors.

NATIONAL OF ILLINOIS.

A Two Million Dollar Loan Brings About the Crisis and Investigation.

CHICAGO—The National Bank of Illinois has closed its doors. It is one of the oldest banks here and has been considered one of the strongest, doing an immense business. On November 30 the bank's statement showed capital, \$1,000,000; surplus, \$1,000,000; undivided profits, \$450,000. A director stated today that a loan made to the Calumet Electric street railway of \$2,400,000 was without the knowledge of the directors. Efforts made to dispose of the Calumet stock held as security for the loan brought about an investigation which resulted in the bank's suspension.
