The Alaska-Treadwell mine, on Douglas Island, Alaska, paid its 33rd dividend, a \$75,000 one, on the 28th inst. It originally cost \$150. Nearly \$1,000,000 has been spent developing the mine. The ore averages 33 per cent, the average cost of milling is \$1.15 per ton.

The rain Saturday night was another memorable downpour. The lightning and thunder if anything was more vivid and the thunder peals more deafening than the storm of a few days previous while the rain came in torrents. The roaring of the seething waters in the Walnut gulch could plainly be heard from our streets after the storm, which is about two miles distant. Judging from high water mark there was over 5 feet of water in the big gulch on its mad rush to the river.

If Tombstone had not such perfect natural drainage there would be some damage from such rains. A similar rain of Saturday at Bisbee would have flooded much of that burg.

FROM FOREIGN LANDS.

An Interesting Letter From G. W. McLane.

MEDELLIN, DEPARTAMENTO DE ANTIOQUIA, COLOMBIA, June 25, 1897. Ed. PROSPECTOR—In my last letter I promised your readers a description of Bogota, but as other occupations crowded me I neglected to do so until now.

Bogota, the most inaccessible capital of all the South American republics, is situated in the heart of the great Andes in a beautiful, broad and fertile valley covering some 200,000 acres and situated nearly 9000 feet above the sea level. Bogota has now a population of 120,000 people. Its national institute was founded by its liberator in 1829 now having students comprising the different branches of literature, philosophy, law, natural science, medicine, surgery, veterinary, mathematics and fine arts. It has 21 colleges and schools for boys and 13 for girls, also telegraphic school; 32 Catholic temples, 12 chapels or oratories, one Protestant church and one charitable hospital; two theatres, one the Teatro Colón, one of the finest in Latin America; military hospital; astronomical observatory founded by Dr. Jose Celestino Mutis, May 24, 1802; four public parks, museum, fine library and electric lights.

One great object worthy of note is the Salto de Tequendama, four leagues southwest of the city, one of the marvels of South America. Many claim the novelty of these falls far superior to those of Niagara. Its 600 feet of waterfall, its rough and shrub covered cliffs, its majestic peaks in the background, its deep and dark chasm surrounded by lofty trees, whose branches are filled with many rare tropical birds of bright plumage, its sombre cliffs and crags and its surrounding solitude in general makes it an object worthy a visit.

The immense plains and llamas covered with succulent pasturage the year around in Southeastern Columbia, threaded with beautiful streams of water, the feeders of the Amazon, offer great inducements to hundreds of thousands of immigrants who could have flourishing businesses of stock raising agriculture and horticulture, as all the grains and fruits of our northern clime do well here as has been proven by a few pioneer settlers. As fine apples as I ever saw in the world came from this direction, brought into Bogota and sold for about 30 cents apiece gold.

The great commercial interests that Bogota holds forth to the outside world as well as to Columbia is a brilliant inducement to capital to construct a railroad from the head of navigation near Yeguas to the city which, for the want of such means of communication, is obliged to receive and send her immense commercial commodities as well as the traveling public, which is no small item itself, on the back of mules for 100 miles.

Later on I will give you a pen picture of the flourishing little city of Medellin, situated in one of the most healthy and richest gold regions of Columbia and entirely cosmopolitan. G. W. McLANE.

RICH SECTION

The Gold Region Long Withheld by Yaquis.

Mr. N. H. Terry and children came in this morning from the San Bernardino ranch confirming the information of a rich gold strike being made in the Yaqui country. It seems all is quiet now in that region no more wars or rumors of war. All that country from the Minas Prietas east to the Mulatas and south to Culiacan is one immense mineral deposit. Tom Cochran held mines south of the Yaqui river which were reported very rich. Now since the Yaquis have made peace with the Mexican government and taken lands in sovereignty the prospector is abroad in that land of gold and as the strike is a noted one Mexicans also flocking to the new discovery between the Yaqui and Maya rivers. Verily this is a year of gold. Mr. Terry reports good grass and creep at San Bernardino. The late rains has made the whole country bring forth its grass and flowers as far as La Ispl. Floods has been raging on the Rio de Hatos and Yaqui rivers yet the Mexican farmer is happy with the prospect of food and gold in the future.
