Our local nurserymen are making large scales of fruit trees the present season. Mr. Brauch has sold several hundred to the soldiers for their garden in Tanner's canyon, and to Mr. Gidd for the La Bota ranch, besides large numbers to other parties. The fruit trees in town are now in full bloom and promise a great yield.

Lieut. Richards and Lieut. Murray, who were sent out after the renegade Indians, have been ordered to return to their respective posts. The Apache scare was evidently manufactured out of whole cloth, as they failed to find an Indian or even any trace of one where they were reported to have been seen.

Wells, Fargo & Co. have deposited \$1,000 with the Clerk of the District Court, to be paid to the parties entitled to the same for the arrest and conviction of Green, the confessed railroad robber, now at Yuma. There being a case in court to determine who are entitled to the same, the court will have to give judgment before it can be paid to anyone.—Star.

AMBUSHED.

A Runaway Wife and Her Escort Waylay and Kill the Pursuing Husband.

The killing of A. J. Martyn last Monday, by Charles Williams and the wife of deceased, on the San Pedro river, about fifteen miles from Tombstone, is a remarkable tale of blood, the particulars of which were yesterday graphically narrated at the inquest held by Justice Shearer in this city, and are now published for the first time. The last heard from our vigilant Sheriff and his posse, they were still on the trail of the murderers, leading towards the Gila.

EDWARD F. FOSTER, Residence, Nacozari, Sonora; occupation, miner; testified as follows: On the morning of the 27th of February, A. J. Martyn, Wm. Davidson and myself left Hill's ranch, on the San Pedro, and went to Somers' ranch, and learned that Charley Williams and the woman known as Tommy Martin had taken supper there the night before, after which they went through Somers' field and crossed the San Pedro river. We followed their tracks for three or four miles west of Somers' ranch, and about 11 o'clock we left the trail and rode up on the mesa towards some little hills, where the sign was quite fresh, when we got down and left our horses and started ahead on foot. We arrived within fifty yards of a canyon running down from the hills, when I saw the horses that Williams and the woman had been riding, and called to deceased and Davidson. They came towards me. I went below deceased, to his right down the mesa, and kept looking towards the horses, and again all three of us started towards the canyon. Deceased was about twenty yards ahead of me and probably about ten yards from the bank of the canyon, when I heard four or five shots fired almost simultaneously. I saw deceased stagger back, turn around and fall on his face. Davidson went up to him, turned him over on his back and spoke to him. Deceased groaned once, but uttered no word, and died almost instantly. A few moments after we heard a shot down the canyon, where we afterwards found a dead dog; which had belonged to Martyn and had followed the woman from Sonora. A hat and coat were afterwards found near the scene of the killing, which I identified as belonging to Williams; also some clothing was found belonging to the woman. We remained there a few minutes talking the matter over to find out what we had better do, when Davidson and I went to Somers' ranch and from there to Fairbank, and reported the killing. At Contention we met Sheriff Slaughter and went with him to the place where deceased met with his death. We followed the trail of Williams and the woman on foot till sundown and then rode into Benson. Next day we came back up the river where we learned that the fugitives had stolen a horse from Orson Elliott at Reed's ranch the morning of the 28th. The Sheriff's posse then went down the river, where it was learned that Williams had been at Etz & Everhardy's ranch, about 8 o'clock on the morning of the 28th and had got some food and an old hat. Elliott, Slaughter, Bill Showers and George Boyle went out and found their sign leading towards Wilcox. The three latter took the trail and the balance of us went down to Apadoco's. From there we started east through the hills, and then south. When east of Etz & Everhardy's we saw the track of the horse that Williams was riding and saw that the Sheriff's posse were following. We then came back to Tombstone. Martyn, George Boyle, Wm. Davidson and myself left Nacozari on the 23d inst. for the purpose of overtaking Williams and Martyn's wife, for the reason that Martyn had reported to us that Williams and Tommy had taken \$530 in greenbacks belonging to him, also his horse and saddle. Williams rode Boyle's grey mare and the woman rode a dun horse belonging to Martyn. I saw these horses on the 27th inst. about 75 yards from the place where Martyn was killed. It was the trail of these two horses and a dog that we had followed. None of our party fired a shot, although all were armed. Williams had a 45 caliber pistol, but don't know whether the woman had any arms or not. I heard deceased say that he wanted to kill Williams on sight. He had a rifle in his hand when shot. I cannot say whether there was one or more persons shooting at deceased. When we returned with Sheriff Slaughter to the place where Martyn was killed we found the camp, the horses, saddles and bridles, some blankets, an old quilt, coat and pants worn by the woman while living in Nacozari. All the shots were fired before Martyn fell, except the one heard down the canyon.

Wm. Davidson testified to the facts above stated.

The jury then retired and brought in a verdict as follows: "That name of deceased was A. J. Martyn, age 39 years, nativity United States, and that he came to his death from gunshot wounds inflicted by Charles Williams and the woman known as Tommy Martyn."

Mrs. Ben Goodrich and daughters left last Wednesday for their new home in Phenix. Phenix society is to be congratulated upon the acquisition, for family ever stood higher in this community, and none would be more sadly missed.

By unanimous vote it is ordered that the Treasurer be and he is instructed to transfer to the School Fund from licenses collected, \$200 to Tevison District; \$100 to Boho District and \$50 to Sulphur Spring District.
