LERDO'S LEGACY.

Further Particulars of the Shake-up

Giant Tidal Waves Wreak Dire Destruction.

[Yuma Times Aug. 12.]

From a number of persons who have arrived from Lerdo and also some Cocopah Indians, who have come in from Lower California, it has been learned that the tremor of July 30th was very severe. There are only a few white inhabitants on the Lerdo tract and the property to damage is slight. A great noise accompanied the shocks and in some places there were thunder storms. One or two small hills and bluffs on the river are reported to have been thrown down. Small cracks and crevices opened in the ground. As to the effect on the

there is a small stream. The shock was undoubtedly much harder in Lower California, west of the river. The only reports so far have been brought in by Cocopah Indians and their language seems inadequate to describe the phenomena. A tidal wave of considerable height came up the river from the gulf. The ordinary tides of the Gulf of California are 30 feet and the highest known tide was 33 feet. These gulf tides are the third highest in the world. The wave came up as far as the colony or about 70 miles from the gulf. The time usually required for the tide to traverse the distance is 8 or 10 hours.

Refreshing rains have fallen this week in our vicinity, and reports of a similar nature are received from all over the valley and adjoining valleys.

Dr. Porter's condition remains practically unchanged, although Dr. Holcombe continues to speak encouragingly.

Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Bussey arrived Thursday evening to become residents of Wilcox.

The San Simon Cattle Association hold their round up meeting today at San Simon station.

A gentleman up from San Pedro reports little or no rain in his section, and cattle are suffering.

Rumor has it that Captain Bullis, acting Indian agent at San Carlos will be relieved Oct. 1st by a civilian agent, the Captain having requested to be relieved.

A military detachment from Fort Huachuca removed the military wires from the Western Union pole on Friday and Thursday, to iron the wires for its accommodation. A great trouble with Gould's wires caused the removal.

Two young Mexicans were arrested at Cochise for breaking into the section house and taking certain valuables, and were brought into town Friday morning by Constable Howarth and given a hearing before Justice Baker, resulting in their being held to await the action of the next grand jury. The stolen property was recovered.
