LOCAL NOTES.

Skating at the rink to-night.

There was quite an influx of drummers on the stage to-day.

Sheriff Kelton is registered at the Palace Hotel, San Francisco.

The pay rolls of the active mines in Tombstone amount to \$1000 per day.

The will of the late James Price gives all of his effects to J. J. Patton and appoints him executor.

Grace Eden did not meet with much success in El Paso. According to the papers she had a very small house.

The location of the Buena Vista mining claim at Bisbee by Dr. Moore was the only paper filed for record to-day.

The Republican states that the figuring on the extension of the north and south road to Benson is already under way.

Mrs. Van Horn, of Bisbee, a sister of Mrs. Jo McPherson of this city, died on Thursday night after a severe illness in that town.

Dr. Sullivan received a telegram this morning requesting his presence at Benson to attend Calvin Reed of St. David who was very low.

Arizona was represented in the 102 votes in favor of free coinage at the Omaha convention. Bro. Morford of the Phenix Herald did it.

Mr. Castañeda of the popular Virginia Hotel at Benson, has returned to that railroad center after a few days visit with his family in Tombstone.

Lieut. Johnston of the tenth cavalry shot and killed Henry Barry, a cattleman last Wednesday at Fort Thomas. A drunken quarrel caused the shooting.

Jo Haffner was placed under \$300 bonds in Justice Alvord's court yesterday, to appear before the next grand jury on a charge of grand larceny.

The Yuma Times states that the locators on the Algodones grant intend to take actual possession of their claims by building houses, fencing and plowing.

The cost of operating the Yuma prison amounts to \$11,000 per quarter, taking the last quarter as an average one. The cost per day is 81 cents for each prisoner.

The total number of men employed on the live stock ranges in the United States is given by the census department at 15,390. In Arizona the number employed is given at 1550.

A man in El Paso while looking down the muzzle of a six-shooter to see if it was loaded, felt the full force of a bullet in his brain. The coroner's jury brought in a verdict of accidental suicide.

Railroadings.

From the statistics on railroads published by the inter-state commerce commission is gathered much valuable information regarding the cost of railroads in the United States. The average cost of running a passenger train one mile is 83 cents. The average cost of a freight train per mile is \$1.06 and the average of all trains per mile is 94 cents. The average cost of carrying a passenger one mile is two cents. The average cost of carrying one ton one mile is three-fifths of a cent, while the average revenue per mile from freight is one cent per ton. There is no reason why the cost of operating a road between Tombstone and Fairbank should amount to more than the average as stated above.

Rev. F. W. Downs says that of all the towns he visited during his summer outing in Arizona, he found none where the people were better clothed, better fed or better fixed financially than they are in Tombstone.

M. Rosenberg of Benson was in El Paso one day last week and while there was interviewed by the El Paso Herald man, and among other things, said: "It is low more than eleven years since I went to Arizona, and I have since been continuously engaged in commercial enterprises there. While I have not been interested myself directly in mining, I have interested myself to the extent to which it affects my business.

"A little more than a year ago, when silver was quoted in three figures, business was very good. Gradually, as silver depreciated in value, the low grade mines were closed, the miners were thrown out of employment, there was little money in circulation and business interests of every class became woefully depressed.

"My business takes me often to both Tombstone and Tucson, and, while affairs are by no means stagnant at these points, the business of a year ago, or of two years ago, is not done now."

A Mexican Product.

The Maguay or Century plant is cultivated extensively in Mexico for liquor which is made from it. George McLane, who came up from the state of Jalisco, reports one city, that of Tequila, as having a large population wholly dependent upon this industry for a livelihood. There are 12,000 acres under cultivation and eight distilleries in operation. One firm shipped 47,000 gallons of this liquor to San Francisco in one shipment. The liquor is called Tequila, which is simply a superior quality of mescal.

Cons to Newcastle.

There is an abundance of mesquite wood on the lands settled upon by the Yuma Indians, says the Yuma Times. The mesquite is the best among the hard woods and can always be sold. Of course at Yuma the demand is limited, but in Los Angeles where fuel is high, mesquite wood always brings good prices. A few years ago the Yuma Indians sold large quantities of the wood to parties who shipped it to southern California. Two representatives of the Yumas went to Los Angeles with a view of making arrangements for the sale of such wood as they might ship there. Their return is anxiously awaited by a large number of Indian wood choppers.
