THE result of the visit of Messrs.
English, Swain and Monmonier to

FRENCH GOLD.

The Government of France
Unties the Strings to Her
Yellow Metal.

That Busted Boom—Big Coal
Deal—Cleveland's Move-
ments—Is Nevada's Leg-
islature Illegal?

Disbursing Gold.

WASHINGTON—The director of the
mint has received a cablegram from
Paris stating the Bank of France is
disbursing gold heavily, for the reason
the lawful note issue limit has been
reached, and also because of the re-
cent large withdrawal of notes by
banks and others for the purpose of
increasing reserves. It is believed at
the treasury department that large
disbursements of gold by the Bank of
France, which is directly contrary to
the policy it has pursued the past 10
years, will have the effect of sensibly
reducing the export of gold from the
United States. The Bank of France,
it is stated, has \$300,000,000 gold in
its vaults, the accumulation of years.

A Busted Bubble.

DENVER—A special to the Times
from Mancos, says: Between 50 and
75 people came in from the San Juan
gold fields yesterday, and hundreds
are on the way back, disgusted and
discouraged. Large rewards are offered
for the person responsible for the
starting of this busted boom. They
all declare that there is but little gold
in the diggings and the country is
overrun by fortune hunters.

Childs Whips Soldier Walker.

SAN FRANCISCO—Frank Childs, the
colored pugilist, of Los Angeles, and
Soldier Walker, of San Francisco,
fought a hurricane battle at the Fair
Alto club last night. Childs won in
three rounds, knocking the white man
senseless.

Nova Scotia Coal Fields.

HALIFAX—It is stated in good
authority that the coal magnates of
Pennsylvania, acting with the Canadian
Pacific Railway, have about con-
cluded a deal by which the entire coal
fields of Nova Scotia are to pass under
their control. The combine, it is said,
has over \$17,000,000 to invest in the
project. The Nova Scotia legislature
has been called to meet next week to
ratify the bargain.

Number of Cholera Deaths.

HAMBURG—The health officer re-
ports that there were 10,919 deaths
from cholera in 1892, and 26,323
deaths from all causes. The births
number 22,999.

Cleveland Goes to Jersey.

NEW YORK—President elect Cleve-
land will leave the city tomorrow for
Lakewood, N. J., where he will remain
until a special train conveys him to
Washington for the inauguration.

Claims the Legislature Illegal.

SAN FRANCISCO—R. M. Clark, ex-
attorney General of Nevada, declares
the legislature of that state illegal,
because not elected on the basis of
population. The matter will probably
be tested in the courts. Should the
legislature be unelected, the appoint-

ment of a successor to Senator Stewart
would devolve upon Governor Con-
cord, a strong Republican, who will
undoubtedly name a man of that po-
litical faith to fill the vacancy.

Carnot Must Resign.

PARIS—Gravest rumors in regard to
President Carnot are afloat. Several
deputies who have been most earnest
in publishing the Panama scandal de-
clare they will not rest until Carnot is
forced to resign. All eyes are turned
toward Constans as the coming master
of the situation. General Seouair,
military governor of Paris, has been
sounded by socialists and been ap-
pealed to but has given them no en-
couragement as to what he would do
in the event of an uprising.

HARTFORD, Conn.—In the Demo-
cratic caucus to-day, ex-Congressman
Carlos French was nominated for
United States senator. A joint ses-
sion will be held Tuesday next.
