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OFFICIAL REPORT
Of Board of Supervisors of Cochise County.

Oct. 4, 1893.
9:30 o'clock a. m.
Board met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—Chairman Perkins and Supervisor Nichols.
Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.
Geo. Watt appeared on behalf of C. B. Tarbell in reference to burying an indigent dead person, not being certain as to proceeding in the matter without the knowledge of the Board.

The Board instructed him to proceed with the burial, and the district attorney was instructed to look up the law in the matter and report.
Claim of Scott White, sheriff, fees and expenses for second quarter 1893, amounting to \$4091.36 was presented for action.

The Board by the following vote refused to have the claim re-submitted: Chairman Perkins and Supervisor Nichols; Supervisor Clark not voting.
Sheriff White proposed an agreed case before the district court, which was on motion assented to and the district attorney was instructed to place the matter before the district court on an agreed statement of facts.

The Board on motion appointed A. V. Lewis of Bisbee live stock inspector in accordance with act providing for the inspection of and requesting the slaughtering of animals for sale in the territory (approved April 10, 1893) and the clerk was instructed to notify him of such appointment and district attorney.

Board checked the reports of the treasurer and counted the cash in the treasurer's safe and found all correct.

Boards examined and checked assessor's report and approved same.
Board stood at recess until 1:30 o'clock p. m.

Same members present.

Board took up fees bills of the different justices and constables for auditing.

Action on the bill of Haniger & Co. for feeding prisoners at Bisbee was on motion deferred until a report from the jailer at Bisbee could be had.

The clerk was instructed to notify the jailer at Bisbee to file a report properly certified to as to the number of prisoners confined at that place during third quarter, and the number of meals furnished them while in custody; also in what cases jurors were furnished meals and by whose orders.

On motion the Board allowed the sum of \$8 per month for the support of Margaret Locklin, an indigent, the aforesaid allowance to be drawn by Mrs. A. Adamson and by her to be disbursed for the support of said indigent. Roll called: Yeas, Perkins Nichols and Clark.

Four births and one death occurred at Bisbee during the past month.

Miss Nettie Rafferty returned home today from a visit to the Land ranch.

Dick Clark, wife and child left today for a visit east to relatives. They will return about Nov. 1st.

Grass in the Sulphur Spring valley is four feet high and in places is high enough to hide the cattle from view.

A marriage license was granted by the probate judge today to Lucas Malino and Angelita Martinez, both of Bisbee.

A row in front of the court house about 7 o'clock this morning awoke late risers in the neighborhood. No blood was shed.

County Superintendent Monmonier has appointed P. B. Warnekros school trustee to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Read's departure. The appointment is a good one.

The term of Postmaster Harwood expires on January 26th next. He has given general satisfaction, and it is improbable that his successor will be appointed before that time. There are now seven applicants in the field.

The general impression is that the local school board of trustees is responsible for the change of books in the school. The territorial board of education, consisting of the governor, territorial treasurer and territorial superintendent are the parties invested with that power.

A letter received from Mrs. R. W. Wood, who left for Los Angeles on Friday last in response to a dispatch announcing the serious illness of her son Clarence, states that she found him very ill with typhoid fever, but that he is now somewhat better. Her little daughter Margie, who accompanied her, is quite ill also.

A commotion on Allen street about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon in which Frank Ryan and G. W. Swain were the active participants, caused a little excitement for awhile.

From what can be learned the trouble grew out of an intended joke of Mr. Swain in which he called Ryan a ticket-of-leave man. This rather nettled Mr. Ryan and he at once assumed the aggressive, with the result that a black and blue impression of his fist embellishes Mr. Swain's left optic.

Mr. Swain claims that a knife was used and inflicted a severe cut just below the eye, but Ryan says that the knife which was afterward picked up on the sidewalk had fallen from his pocket in the struggle.

Swain had Ryan arrested on a charge of using a deadly weapon and the case is set for the 10th inst in Justice Koska's court.

Fire at Fairbank.

Alex Durward confirms the report current late yesterday afternoon of a disastrous conflagration at Fairbank, which destroyed Blinn's lumber yard and warehouse.

E. A. Storrs and family have been residing in the dwelling house belonging to the company in the proximity of the lumber yard, Mr. Storrs being in charge of the place. At about 10 o'clock Tuesday night the family retired, leaving a fire in the kitchen stove. They were aroused about 2 o'clock by the strong odor of fire and discovered the roof burning at the stove pipe. Despite strenuous efforts to extinguish the fire it gained rapid headway, totally destroying the dwelling and the long lumber sheds and warehouse with their contents.

Over fifty thousand feet of lumber, thousands of dollars' worth of doors, windows and other building materials, which were stored in the warehouse, loots up a loss of over \$70,000. The only insurance was on the warehouse building.

A train of freight cars was standing on the track near the warehouse and being in immediate danger the railroad agent at Fairbank telegraphed to Benson for an engine to take them to a place of safety. But for the forethought of that gentleman the cars would have been consumed as lumber was burned on the other side of the track.

Mr. Durward also suffered a heavy loss in the destruction of over three hundred bales of hay and nearly five hundred sacks of barley stored in the warehouse, valued at \$700 to \$900.

W. F. Staunton returned home today from a short business trip to El Paso.

The board of commissioners of the territorial prison met this week. The usual maintenance and salary accounts were audited. The gross expense during the quarter was \$13,043.82; the cost per capita per diem, after deducting money received from sale of hogs, rock and blue dirt, the net or true cost was \$11,309.17, or \$7 6-10 cents per capita per diem. The contract with the Yuma Water and Light Co was continued for another year at the same rate of \$200 per month. The superintendent's report shows that there were in confinement July 1st 146 convicts; received during the quarter 7; pardoned to restore citizenship, 3; pardoned unconditionally, 3; discharged 9; died 3, leaving on hand Oct. 1st 135 prisoners.

BY WIRE.

Hardman Peck, Co, piano dealers of New York failed yesterday.

Bismarck condition is reported so serious that it is doubtful if he ever leaves Kissengen alive.

In a quarrel between Italians at Brooklyn resulted in the death of three of them and wounding of several others.

Two hundred and six is the number of dead and lost lives in the devastated country along the gulf coast as the result of the storm.

Ten persons were killed and three were injured by a panic resulting from a fire in a church at Paragarieto near the City of Mexico Sunday.

The steamer Jeanie arrived at San Francisco yesterday and brings the news that the whaler Newport reached 84 degrees north latitude, the most northerly point ever reached by man.

Arrangements have been made for a contest between Weir of Boston and Murphy, of Australia, for the American featherweight championship. It will be held at Boston on Nov. 2.

The Valkyrie won in the great yacht race at New York.

Dr. Eugene West was held to answer for the murder of Addie Gilmour at San Francisco.

Fifteen business houses and one residence were destroyed by fire at Fulton, Ark., yesterday. The total loss is \$50,000.

From authentic reports received at Portland, Or., it is believed there has been a recent and sudden uprising of the natives in Alaska. Many persons were killed, among them being several missionaries sent out by the American Board.

A special from Oswego, New York, says: The steamer Colonial, of Buffalo, is ashore on Pigeon Island, and it is thought both the boat and cargo will be a total loss. A furious storm is raging. It is impossible to reach the boat from any point while the gale lasts and if the weather does not moderate soon the crew will find a watery grave.

Over 2,000 killed and nearly \$5,000,000 property demolished is the record of the great gulf storm in Louisiana. There has never been anything approximating it since the country was settled. More than half the population in the devastated region is dead. Everything is wrecked and the survivors are without food, shelter or clothing. Over 120 fishing vessels were in the gulf fishing when the storm broke over Chinesea. Not a word has been heard from them or the occupants since.
