Suicides in France.
 The minister of justice has just published some statistics of suicides which are not without interest. They show an average of a per cent. for males under twenty years of age, and of 33 per cent. for men over sixty. Of suicides of females, on the other hand, 9 per cent. were those of girls under twenty, while there were not more than 27 per cent. for women over sixty years of age. Twenty-six per cent. of the suicides were attributed to mental derangement, and 29 to physical suffering. Drunkenness is held responsible for 12 per cent. and love affairs for 4.

Most of the men had recourse to the rope, while the women preferred death by drowning, though some took poison, which seems to be altogether eschewed by the sterner sex. Strangely enough, suicides are far more frequent in the spring and summer than during the colder months, which leads to the inference that want, which is much more prevalent in the winter than in the other seasons, is not the usual cause of these sad determinations to be rid of life.—London Telegraph.

A Wonderful Shake.

POSTAL NOTES.
 POSTAGE stamps are counted eleven times during the process of manufacturing. SWITZERLAND has more post offices in proportion to its population than any other country. The postage longest in use and still used is the 3d of New South Wales. It was first issued in 1854. Less than fifty years ago there was no postal system in this country. Previous to 1847 the mails were carried by private firms, and rates varied according to distance.

In the conference of the Michigan federation of labor a resolution favoring the coinage of both gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 was adopted by unanimous vote.

H. E. Huntington has been elected president of the Central Pacific railroad company, to succeed the late Senator Stanford. Huntington is a nephew of C. P. Huntington, president of the Southern Pacific, and came to California about two years ago.

There is excellent authority for saying that Minister Willis' present orders are to employ no force of arms. It is probable that the instructions by the Corwin are for him to proceed in his effort to persuade the provisional government to allow Liliuokalani to be reinstated.
