The executive committee of the World's Columbian exposition decline to take official cognizance of the fire or any claims that may arise from it. The French commissioners however will demand that French losses be made good.

E. B. Gage, accompanied by Mrs. Gage, came in today. This is their first visit since they left for the worlds fair, nearly a year ago. They will remain in Tombstone several days during which time Mr. Gage will straighten out some business affairs.

Francisco Salcedo, a well known cattle man of Cochise county, was arrested today on the instigation of Collector Sam Webb, and brought to Tombstone where he was taken before U. S. Commissioner Swain and bail fixed at \$500 which was given. His examination was set for the 21st. He is charged with smuggling cattle. It is claimed that he has a large band of cattle in Sonora which are leased on shares and that he recently brought over 24 head without the formality of a call upon the custom house at La Noria. His friends claim that his innocence can be proven beyond a doubt but the authorities are equally confident of his guilt.

Another Mixture.

The appeal in the mandamus suit of McAllister vs. Hawke and Perkins which was before the supreme court, was dismissed yesterday on account of an error in the perfection of the papers.

This leaves the matter just where it stood after Judue Sloan gave a judgment for McAllister and from which judgment the appeal was taken. It will now be in order for Chairman Perkins and clerk Hawke to recognize Mr. McAllister as a supervisor which no doubt will be done at the next quarterly meeting of the board.

Can he withdraw his resignation and again act? If he can will he do so? Can Mr. Bryan, who took his place, maintain an action for the seat? And third and lastly where are we at?

Smokeless Powder.

Nick Noble has been experimenting with smokeless powder and believes he sees great advantage in its use. He loaded several shells in two lots, one containing the black powder and the other the white or smokeless powder. Mr. MacDonald had made every arrangement to render the occasion a success and to have the best horse win. He had the track in perfect condition, the colt, Cricket, was in fine mettle and Mac was confident he would ride the winner. Early in the day the people began to arrive and from early morn till evening we patiently awaited the coming of the horse, Bunk, but he failed to materialize. Finally word was received that Mr. Bastian was laid up with an attack of pneumonia at Tombstone and the race was unavoidably postponed.

Wants Feeders.

The stockman says that C. W. Merchant of Abilene, Texas, spent last Saturday in Wilcox and in driving to some of the neighboring cattle ranches.

With himself are associated Messrs. Parramore and Lewis, of the same city and they desire to purchase a large number of feeders aged two and three years. P. B. Soto closed a trade for 1210 head and received instructions to purchase 1000 head more at the same figure. They pay \$11 and \$14 for delivery of the cattle between April 20 and May 20, paying three dollars per head down to bind the bargain.


