A HOLIDAY
Fittsburg and Pearceville to Attend the Circus—Off on a Visit—The Mines—Strike Water.

Word came from Fittsburg and Pearceville that both villages will declare tomorrow a legal holiday and all hands will attend the circus at Wilcox on that day in a body.

URIAN, Cal.—Parties arriving in this city today from Round Valley state positively that Jack Littlefield, who was lynched for the alleged shooting of J. M. Vinton last week, was not within twenty miles of the scene of the shooting at the time it occurred. Trinity county authorities will be asked to investigate the matter with the idea of apprehending Littlefield's murderers.

SAN FRANCISCO.—The trial of Theodore Durrant was replete with sensation today. Henry J. McCoy, General secretary of the Y. M. C. A. who was cited for contempt last Monday for telling Juror Truman that if he did not hang Durrant the people would hang him, was fined \$200, with the alternative of five days in the county jail.

During the cross-examination of the witnesses summoned by the defense, the prosecution developed the fact that a student at Cooper Medical College who did not attend the lecture delivered by Dr. Cheney on the afternoon of April 3 was recorded present on the roll book. This testimony is of the greatest importance to the prosecution.

The last sensation of the day was an order made by the court committing Mrs. Carrie Cunningham, a newspaper reporter, to the county jail for refusing to answer a question. The defense desired to impeach the testimony of Mrs. Leak, who said she did not tell Miss Cunningham that she saw Durrant and Miss Lamont enter Emmanuel Baptist Church on the afternoon of April 3d.

CITY OF MEXICO.—President Diaz has given peremptory orders that the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight shall not occur on Mexican soil.

SAN FRANCISCO.—A local paper says there is a strong probability that another fight will be made to have the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight take place in San Mateo county under the auspices of the Gloma Athletic Club.

KANSAS CITY.—The Carnival Krewe parade comes off today. Elaborate preparations have been made for this event of jollity. Excursions will be run from neighboring towns. Delegations of paraders from Missouri and Kansas cities will be in the line of procession.

AUSTIN, TEX.—There will be no fight at D has on October 31 between Corbett and Fitzsimmons. This fact was settled this afternoon by the Texas legislature in exactly three hours. Two committees, one in the senate and the other in the house, gave an audience to Dallas attorneys all morning the ascertain their objections and entertain protests against the passage of the law. After hearing the gentlemen until noon the two committees adjourned. This afternoon when the two houses met at 2 o'clock both committees were ready to report, and the senate bill very promptly was called.

From the time the bill was placed before the senate on committee to the time it passed was exactly fifty-five minutes. The bill was immediately sent over to the house, and at 4 o'clock that body began discussing it, substituting the senate bill for the house bill. A final vote was reached at 6 o'clock and the bill passed the house.

Thus within three hours did the Texas legislature forever put an end to prize fighting in Texas.

SAN DIEGO, Cal.—The preliminary examination of Joe Ebanks, under arrest for the murder of Mrs. Leroy R. Stiles and her father, J. B. Rorden, on the beach north of Ocean-side last month, was begun today. Evidence for the prosecution was mainly circumstantial and has failed to make out a very strong case against Ebanks as yet.
