COUNTY GOVERNMENT

By Whom Ideal County Government Should be Run

ED PROSPECTOR—
"A County is one of the civil divisions of a state for judicial and political purposes.
In some states the counties are regarded as corporations, in others as "quasi corporations."
To constitute a county, something more than a law defining its boundaries,—a local government must be provided.

In all the states and organized territories there are political divisions called counties which bring home rule, and local government near to the people, in fact to their homes; and it necessarily follows as a sequence from the premise, that the people are directly chargeable with what sort of county government they have—whether good to be applauded, or bad to be regretted, as they set in motion in so small a territory as a political division called a county, the entire machinery by which it is to run; and it should be borne in mind all the time, that every office is considered public, the duties of which concern the public.

There is not and should not be any politics in county government matters; such matters should be attended to upon a purely business basis, by thorough business men, upon business principals. Each man attending to the business in any capacity, should be capable and honest.

This was the primary purpose of county government acts.
It must be admitted however that county offices have descended into the partisan political scramble for the places, and inasmuch as this is true it would be well if the different party conventions would nominate the most capable, honest and best citizens to the places, so that the people in any event would be sure to have honest and capable men to fill the county offices; such at least must be desirable.

We think it would be good policy on the part of the people to get the Legislature to pass a law dividing each county into three Superior districts and one Supervisor to be elected from each district, and requiring the Board of Supervisors to divide the counties into such districts, not as to size of territory, but a proper division into three equal parts as near as may be of the population of the counties. By this method there will be equal fairness to all and injustice to none, and all parts of a county would be fairly represented on the Board.

Under the present system all the Supervisors may come from one part of a county, where the population is largest, and all the remaining parts of a county go unrepresented except by those that are elected from the part where the population is large. This is not the policy or intention of county government acts; it is rather the purpose and intention of such acts that as all property holders in the counties no matter in what part of the county they live, must pay taxes in support of the county government. It follows that all parts of the county should be represented on the Board, that regulates the amount of taxes that should be paid and passes on the proper disbursements of such taxes when paid. In other words that taxation and representation should go together and this is the primary object of local government and home rule.

True, there are smaller divisions in counties of which we may treat in another article.
The most important of all the county offices to a county are the Board of Supervisors, for they deal with questions that affect the entire people of a county. Their duties are various and responsible, for they can exercise all the power given them by statute and a great deal of discretionary power in equitable manner, hence it follows:

That they ought to be and should be three of the very best citizens of a county, regardless of their political affiliations. Sound practical business men, men of affairs, men of at least reasonable education, capable and honest, men who conduct their own affairs with diligence and prudence, and who could be depended upon to conduct the affairs of a county in the way they would be willing to have their own affairs conducted; men who have no political enemies to punish, or political friends to reward, growing out of the election to their places.

The next most important office to a county is the assessor, for we have to depend upon him in a great measure

for the proper valuation of the property of the people, real and personal, in his county. In this office to do the business right he must be capable and he should be honest. He should be a good judge of property, both real and personal. In no case should he discriminate in favor of one against another, but should assess property at its cash value no matter in whose hands he finds it. The millionaire and the man with one hundred dollars worth of property should be assessed alike pro rata, and by doing this the law and the people are satisfied.

The office of District Attorney is very important to the people, on account of the various duties required by law to be performed by him.
He should be a man of fair education, well versed in the fundamental principles of the law; of at least average ability, and more, if the people can get such a man; of strict integrity and high character.

He should know the distinction between prosecution and persecution, he should never fall in the one, or resort to the other. The law constitutes the District Attorney the legal adviser of all county officers, and of all the Justices of the Peace in the county, as to the performance of their duties. The public prosecutor of all public offences committed within the county, and as such act in the District and Justice courts; advise grand juries, prepare indictments for them and do all other acts required of them by law. In fine he should be a good, capable, lawyer and an honorable man.

The office of Probate Judge, is of the highest importance to the people. This office deals with dead men's estates, with widows and orphans, with guardians and wards, with property and persons, with insane persons, with public schools and how they should be managed, and with the persons who should teach the public schools. Every man, woman and child in a county has an interest in this office, for the people want justice meted out to the heirs of the dead as they expect justice to be meted out to their heirs when alive. It follows then that the man that should fill this office should be a man of fair education, ripe judgment, honest and conscientious, faithful in the discharge of his duties, with knowledge of the law on such subjects.

The Sheriff's Office being an executive office interests every person in a county, for upon the faithful performance of the duties of this office depends to a great extent the law, order and general welfare of every county, for if there is disaffection in this

office it will exhibit itself in lawlessness in whatever county it exists.
The sheriff of a county should be a capable and honest man, determined to do his duty in a legal way with credit to himself and justice to the people. He should be paid for all legal services rendered by him, and should be far above asking pay for any services not performed by him or more than the law allows for such services when performed.

It has been said that the character of a sheriff is generally ascertained by the character of the man he keeps about him as aids, hence he should be careful as to the character of the man he selects as deputies. Capability, honesty and faithful performance of duty should be the essentials and on particular thing should be required of all who hold public office; as the office is one public trust, and made for the convenience of the people and not for the convenience of the officer, that the public business should be attended to in preference to any other business; this is what the people pay for.
