**Political Straws Showing How the Wind Blows**

**COUNTY MENTIONABLES.**

As the political campaign draws near political talk is becoming rife. The man with the political bee in his bonnet is discussed; the merits of the modest man who will consent to run if the nomination is confined upon him; the man in the hands of his friends, the dark horse; the office seeking the man; and the various and diverse phases of political aspirants are all discussed and each day or two the list grows larger. Among those who are talked of, regardless of political complexion, are mentioned the following, the list being by no means complete:

For sheriff the only avowed candidates thus far are Dal Lewis, the present incumbent and R S Hunt of Bisbee. The "mentioned" include: Jos McPherson, Date Graham, Burt Mesman, F E Caldwell, Wm Shilliam and Chas Overlook.  
The Assessorship will not be elective office this year, the law making it appointive by the Board of Supervisors. The term covers four years and doubtless quite a number of aspirants will be on the que vive to knock the plum.

For District Attorney, W P Miller and Seth Leavenworth of Bisbee are out. Those talked of also include: Col Ben Morgan, O Gibson, C T Clark, J M O'Connell. For the Republican choice Chas Bowman is prominently mentioned, G W Swain and S A Merritt also spoken of. E W Land, the present incumbent for the past two terms is not out for re-nomination.

For the legislature B. A. Packard, M. J. Cunningham, Mike Gray, D. K. Wardwell, W. C. Land, H. W. Eiz, J. H. Tevis, Jas Reilly, Geo. W. Wilcox, Dr. Sweet, Stephen Romer, are among the democratic names while C. C. Warner, H. M. Wood, J. W. Farrington, A. H. Emanuel, C. L. Cummings, H. C. Hooker, M. J. Castaneda, H. C. Herrick are among the republican probabilities.

Frank Hare, the present incumbent is strongly urged for re-nomination for recorder; Emil Marks, Geo. Porter, Richard Humphreys, J. D. Kinsey, are spoken of by their friends.  
Probate Judge Bostwick is looked for by his friends to be a candidate for re-nomination. S. K. Williams, I. W. Wallace, F. W. Goodbody and J. F. Duncan are spoken of frequently.

Superintendent of Public Schools, Chas Wallace, W. D. Munmonier, J. N. G. Ives, W. K. Meads, B. J. O'Rilly and F. C. Willard are frequently spoken of.  
For Supervisor, Chairman York will be the contender, and the present incumbents, Geo B Reay and P J Delahanty are spoken of for re-nomination while L C Snattuck, J B Angus, M C Benton, M J Brown, J S Merrill, Chas Douglas, O M Renaud, John Montgomery, Thos Allaire, J J Bowen, Ben Sued, are among those on the "list."

For Treasurership the present incumbent M D Scribner is favorably mentioned for re-nomination; J J Murhead of Bisbee, F N Wolcott, S F McGuire, B F Graham are prominently spoken of.

W F Short, the well known St David rancher came in yesterday with a load of fine garden produce which found ready sale. Mr. Short proposes coming to Tombstone each Tuesday with vegetables.

Ed Thomas, a former Tombstone youth and son of C N Thomas of Bisbee, came in today from the copper camp on a visit to his old home and Tombstone friends. Ed has been service with Uncle Sam for several years, is one of the heroes of the Philippine campaign and can relate some interesting stories of his experiences.

H C Herrick was in Tombstone today enroute to his mines at Dos Cabezas. Mr. Herrick reports a heavy rainfall along the river last night an inch and a quarter of rain being recorded at his ranch. This is the heaviest rainfall experienced for some time and was gratefully received.

During the storm yesterday lightning struck a telephone pole below town and split same. Another caper of the lightning freaks was a visitation at the McPherson residence, where a stray bolt of lightning found its way into the house over the telephone wire and set the wall paper afire directly under the telephone. The occupants of the house happened to be in the room at the time but received no shock and further than having quite a scare, fortunately no injury was recorded. The fire ignited by the lightning mark was promptly extinguished before the flames were under headway.

A disastrous forest fire has been raging in the Wallapai mountains this week. It has destroyed a great deal of valuable timber on the east side of the range, taking out a strip ten miles square between Pine Flat and Wheeler's ranch.—Chloride Arrow.

There are now 909 lepers and 164 healthy persons at the Molokai settlement in Hawaii, according to a report just received from the quarantine officer. In the last ten years only ten clean rascals have become lepers. The oldest patients on the island arrived in 1874 and 1875. The recruits to the settlement each year during the last decade range from 182 in 1896 to 85 in 1900.

A whole carload of Chinamen passed through Tucson on No 9 last night. They are enroute to San Francisco, where they will be deported for being in the United States contrary to law. Arizona added its usual quota of celestial to the number from Texas and New Mexico. One was put in the car at Bowie, and five were added to the list from Tucson. United States Marshal McCord left on the train for San Francisco with the Arizona prisoners in charge.—Citizen.

On the recommendation of ex-Governor Murphy a board of pension examining surgeons has been established at Kingman, Arizona, consisting of Drs A E Ely, A M Corine and John R Whiteside.

Tombstone does not think the taxpayers of Cochise county want to be burdened with more indebtedness by consenting to the county seat removal.

J Perpont Morgan, having secured control of about everything on the surface, is going into the underground railway business.

A. W. Howe and bride arrived yesterday from their California honeymoon trip and will make their future home here, having taken up their residence at the Howe cottage on Fulton street.

The Free Public Library has received a donation of "The Y-lvet Glove" from Mr E. Percy Smith and the promise of several books from Mayor Emanuel.

**BISBEE JOTTINGS.**

Bisbee, July 30, 1902.

The immigration of Scandinavians to this country has been larger in the past six months than in any previous half year. They are a good class of immigrants.

Within the past five years 3,000,000 Irishmen have emigrated from the Emerald Isle, a fact that is hard to reconcile with the claim that England has produced the greatest streamers of the age.

Bob Fitzsimmons insists that he has reformed and will do no more fighting. The public, however, will wait to see whether his heart is in the right place or not.

A proposition has been presented to the Nogales town council for adoption of an ordinance prohibiting women in saloons, and quite a strong pressure made for immediate action.

The socialists of Yuma county held a meeting on Saturday, July 19, at the court house for the purpose of effecting organization and setting date for a convention.

The Pride of the West, in the P. & Gonia district, Santa Cruz county, is working about 200 men. A Corliss engine, two new boilers and a converter are being installed.

People might accept the story regarding the unearthing of Noah's ark in Alaska if it were not for a well founded suspicion that Dewey sunk the craft in Manila bay.

The Southern Pacific R. R. has transferred its New York ocean business from New Orleans to Galveston. This saves some 350 miles of rail transportation. The freight handled is valued at \$50,000,000 yearly.

The saving of a cent a ton in the cost of producing iron ore at the Lake Superior mines amounts to about \$200,000 annually on the entire production of the district.

Zinc is steadily climbing up in price and it is now quoted in the market at \$40 per ton. It is predicted that the price will range upward for some months and that it will reach as high as \$60.

Phoenix is preparing to collect an aggregation of fast ball players there this winter and will try to arrange games with outside cities.

Judge Williams of Bisbee received a letter recently from Los Angeles which asked for the particulars of the killing of Emil Marks. As Mr Marks has had no trouble and is in excellent health the letter was referred to him for reply. It is a mystery how such a report could have reached Los Angeles.—Review.

There is some talk in the Prescott papers of running Hon. R. E. Sloan for delegate to congress on the republican ticket. The judge has not yet announced his intent on.

Those who are negligent enough to permit their cows or horses to roam about the city limits may learn how too late that the city pound ordinance is still in force and effect. The city pound is located on the corner of Fourth and Toughnut.

The report that a large number of Y-quis have crossed the line and finding their way to the grading camps to work on the Tombstone branch is unfounded. No authentic report of any large migration of these Indians for this point has been announced.

In the Dragoon mountains in this county, 13 miles from Benson and 6 miles north of Dragoon, is a deposit of asbestos, one of the ores of tungsten. Considerable development work has been done and as much as 50 tons of first class ore have been mined in one year.

The "dreaded Arizona summer" is almost gone, tho' what anyone finds to "dread" about the present summer is fast fading out. Free from the oppressive heat of the past, cool nights are nearly every day, and nights are delightful. All in all there is no place within the bounds of the United States where one suffers less discomfort during July and August than here.


