TOMBSTONER WAS ON ILL FATED SHIP

Robert Axtell of This City a Survivor of the Wrecked Ship Santa Rosa

MANY ALARMING REPORTS CAUSE ANXIETY

Among the passengers on the ill-fated steamship Santa Rosa which was wrecked off Point Arguello near Santa Barbara, was Robert Axtell of Tombstone. Much anxiety was felt here among his relatives and friends who feared the worst, until a telegram was received by E. H. Reeves to the effect that Axtell had reached shore at Santa Barbara and was safe.

The wreck is reported one of the worst in recent years and the big passenger boat left a total loss of the passengers were saved. Today's advices as announced by the steamship company state all the passengers were saved after heroic effort but that four members of the crew were drowned. Persistent reports are had that quite a number of passengers are missing.

Last Sunday evening William King colored, ran amuck in south Prescott and was arrested. The next day Justice McLane gave him a ninety-day jail sentence.

Don Miguel Duran, aged 74 years, died at St. John's the other day, he having never recovered from the amputation of his right foot about 11 months ago.

A couple of weeks ago while returning from work one evening, and while walking along north Cortez street, David McDaniel fell to the ground and expired. He had lived in Prescott for several years and was an employe at the railroad shops there. He was sixty-nine years of age.

The Yavapai Metals company will put a new hoisting plant on its property. This company is making ore shipments to the Humboldt smelter with fine returns. Net returns on 80,894 pounds of ore is given at \$2.385.

The new water wheel installed last week at the C Y Hopkins ranch, near Jerome, is working perfectly and is lifting water to a height of 24 feet, from which point about 35 acres of excellent acres of land surrounding their residence, recently cleared, is now under cultivation. This land was covered with a growth of shrubbery which has taken three men two months to clear and has required \$200 worth of powder for blasting. GRIM DISCOVERY ON SAN PEDRO

Skeleton Found of Man Who Met a Terrible Death in Treacherous Quicksands

HORSE ALSO MEETS TRAGIC FATE

Parley Lusk one of the ranchers on the San Pedro river, came up this morning on a business trip. During his stay Mr. Lusk related the story of finding the skeleton of a human being near his place.

About three days ago he was engaged with several others in digging a ditch on the bank of the river, when his shovel came in contact with a hard substance and upon investigation it was found that a perfect skeleton, still intact, was uncovered standing upright.

It appears that at some time or other the person was crossing the river at that point and caught in the quicksand and immediately sucked in. This, Mr. Lusk states, is the only solution that can be had for the discovery.

He stated further that some two months ago a similar discovery was made about three miles below his place, by the finding of the perfect skeleton of a horse, which had evidently died in the same manner.
