## CATTLE SHIPMENTS FROM SONORA

### Soaring Cattle Prices Bring Out Large Herds From Across the Line for American Markets

#### ARIZONA INSPECTOR BUSY ISSUING PERMITS

Cattle shipments from Sonora have already commenced and promise to be heavy this fall, according to United States Livestock Inspector Dr. H. M. Hart.

Dr. Hart states that contrary to early expectations cattle imports from Sonora to Arizona border points will be heavy this fall. This is occasioned by the prevailing good prices offered. Stock raisers had not expected prices to be as good as those of last spring, but they are better and the offer of good prices has produced sales where none had been expected.

## The Strike Situation at Tucson --Both Sides Firm And Expect To Triumph

Nineteen shopmen, foremen and machinists walked out from shops on the Tucson division today, swelling the strikers daily register to 120 according to M. M. Regis. He states that two foremen walked out in Tucson, two in Gila Bend, two machinists' helpers in Lordsburg, and the rest in Benson and Yuma.

A few new shopmen are being brought in to take the places of those who walked out, Master Mechanic Peterson states. Eight arrived from the east this morning, it is reported. The master mechanic states that with the force now on hand all necessary repairs are being kept up. --Tucson Citizen.

## ARIZONA NEWS OF INTEREST

### Newsy Notes From All Over Arizona Carefully Condensed for The Prospector Readers

A Mexican who had escaped from the asylum a few days ago, stopped at the Price Brown ranch near Phoenix, and asked for breakfast. Mrs. Brown, seeing that he was demented, phoned to Mr. Brown who was in town at the time, who brought Constable Estrada out with him and they brought the unfortunate back to the asylum.

Bad whisky was responsible for three deaths on the San Carlos Indian reservation in one day. Captain Jack, an Indian policeman, was found lying by the road, on the way to the reservation, his body riddled with bullets. About 10 miles further the body of a young buck and that of a squaw were found. Both had been shot to death. The authorities believe the murders were committed by intoxicated Indians.

Bullets of solid gold were used by Yaqui Indians in fighting against Porfirio Diaz in the recent Mexican revolution. In Mazatlan hospital, where many wounded were operated on, the golden pellets, it was said, were found, although few patients had received enough of them to pay the doctors' bills.

At the Tucson city council meeting the Christian church asked permission to erect a church building on two lots owned by the church at the corner of Fifth street and Second avenue. Opposition arose because a wooden structure was proposed and the matter was referred to the building and lands committee.
