Tax Commission

Case Now Up

The case of the Arizona tax commission against the board of supervisors of Yavapai county will be heard in the supreme court Wednesday morning.

All the papers have been filed, and the supreme court justices have agreed to hear the argument on the 25th. It is believed that all the evidence can be submitted and arguments made in one day.

Attorney General George Purdy Ballard now on the coast, will be back in time to represent the commission. County Attorney P J O'Sullivan of Yavapai will represent the supervisors.

This is an action growing out of the action of the board of supervisors, sitting as a board of equalization, in lowering the assessment of the United Verde Copper company from \$4,500,000 to a little over \$2,000,000. The tax commission instituted mandamus proceedings and lost out in the superior court of Yavapai. An appeal was immediately taken to the supreme court.

The new Arizona automobile law went into effect last Friday.

Under its provisions every owner of a motor vehicle must file for every vehicle owned by him, in the office of the secretary of state, a description of the machine for the purpose of registering the same, including the name of the maker, factory number, style of vehicle and motor power.

Following this he is required to pay an annual registration fee of \$5 for every vehicle of forty horsepower or the A. L. A. M. rating, and a fee of \$10 for every machine that registers a greater horsepower than forty. The motorcycle tax is placed at \$2.

Great fear exists Agua Prieta today that the rebels have planned an attack on that place. General Sanjines says that their movements indicate a purpose to attack the town from east and west simultaneously. When the retreat was made yesterday at Fronteras, Rojas headed toward the Ajp mountains and Salazar in the opposite direction, and it is thought they plan to come into Agua Prieta from opposite directions and make the attack, so bullets will be sure to fall on American soil, in direct disregard of the orders from the war department thus forcing the United States troops to take a hand. It is known that both Salazar and Rojas want to force intervention, and thought that they do not so much desire to take Agua Prieta as to accomplish this end. Douglas International.

Mexican Miners

Strike at Courtland

Because of a refusal to grant them an increase in wages, sixty Mexican miners at the C. & A. mines in Courtland have gone on a strike. The rate asked for was 50 cents a day.

As a result of this walkout the mines are now closed down, while other men are being secured to fill the deserted positions. In Gleason, about three miles from Courtland, there is much bitter feeling on the part of the Mexicans against the mine operators who employ only white labor, and the walkout at Courtland has only tended to complicate matters.

Mexican Federals

The promised movement of 3,000 Mexican federal troops from south of Juarez to Douglas is said to be the result of the direct demands made by American Consul A. V. Dye of Nogales, that Americans and American property in his consular district must be protected.

Of the 3,000, at least 1,200 will be used to garrison the towns and camps where American lives and interests are at stake. Naco is to receive 400, El Tigre 200, the Mormon colonies 200, Pilares de Nacozari 100, Fronteras 100, Yzabel 100, with Caballona and Calabasas 50 each.

Yuma Indian

Carried Insurance

Ambrose Miguel, a young Yuma Indian, who worked at the Yuma round house during the day and beat the snare drum at the Wig Wam Theater in the afternoon, shot himself with a 38 calibre revolver, while on his way home after the performance, Sunday night, inflicting a wound from which he died about 4 o'clock the next morning. Miguel had an insurance of \$2,000 on his life and is probably the only Yuma that ever carried a life insurance. He was a graduate of Carlsle University and was about 30 years of age.

Arrested in Arizona

A Tucson dispatch says: Declaring that the revolution has now become "unprincipled outlawry, with which I could no longer affiliate to be associated" General Emilio Campa, whose identity was unknown when he and ten of his staff and followers were captured yesterday afternoon, thirty miles southwest of Tucson, is placidly awaiting whatever action Mexico or the United States may take. The same view is taken by his aides, Col Jose Ponce and Maj. Emilio Saeches.
