

### Ojeda Will Suicide Before Surrender

"I will cut off my head with my sword before surrendering or crossing into the United States."

This is the statement of General Ojeda. With ranks depleted by killed and wounded men he continues his defiance to the assault of nearly 2000 state troops, besieging the Mexican border town of Naco.

It is reported that large quantities of much needed ammunition were received by the rebels and that the attack will be renewed. Captain Miranda Mendosa, Ojeda's aide, died last night from the wounds he received yesterday. His widow and children are being cared for.

### Honors Awarded At University

In the song contest at Tucson, the first night of the University week program, Miss Irene Greenleaf of Yuma was awarded first place and Miss Nellie Teasdale of Phoenix second place.

In the oratorical contest, Roy Richards of Tempe high school won first honors with Jackson of Mesa high school second.

### Sonora in Sore Need of Funds

The state of Sonora is in need of funds to carry on the revolution against the Diaz-Huerta government, and is using almost every means to secure funds without being evaded.

On April 1st notices were sent broadcast throughout the state telling of a cut in the salaries of all state employees, effective that date. The bill retained by the state is to be considered as a loan, to be repaid the employees after the cause is won.

Another notice was posted at the same time that the salary cut was announced, advising all owners of mineral lands that they pay their taxes to the state instead of the federal government. The taxes were due in March for a four-months period and they must be paid within eight days from date of notice or the mine owners are to suffer the consequences, whatever they might be, as the penalty for non-payment was not mentioned in the notice.

The state has secured 15,000 pesos from the people of Casaca, which is in the nature of a loan, receipts having been issued for same.

### Supreme Court Decision of Great Importance

No decision having a greater bearing on the future of Arizona was ever handed down by the state supreme court than the one which settled the Wood Allen case. It settled more than this one case, for it determined the validity of every law and constitutional amendment submitted to the people at the November election. Had the decision of the lower court against Allen not been upheld, all of those laws and amendments would have been declared invalid. Included in the number are the equal suffrage amendment, the game law, 3-cent fare law, full crew law and many others.

The court decided that the election was a general election and that since the people passed on the laws and amendments in good faith their will shall hold.

### Arizona High School Athletic Association

Arizona high schools now have an athletic organization which is much similar to the organizations of like kind found in all states of the middle west. The new organization is known as the Arizona State High School Athletic Association. Its constitution and by-laws were approved at Tucson by visiting high school officials, and officers were elected for the ensuing year as follows: Harold Steele of Tucson high school, president; Frank Hart, Prescott high school, vice president; G E Cornelius, Winslow high school, secretary-treasurer.

The high schools of the state will be governed by this athletic association on all contests and all matters of dispute will be sent to the three officers above named.

### Petitions to Vote on Capital Punishment

Petitions asking that the question of capital punishment be submitted to the people at the next general election are being received rapidly.

Kenneth MacNichol and John D. Dixon, who started the present movement, have petitions bearing several hundred names, which they will file with the secretary of state in a few days. They require about 2500 names.

### Against Uniform High School Books

It was the unanimous opinion of the high school officials, assembled at the university at Tucson, that the uniform text book law in regard to high schools was bad and should be repealed. A committee was appointed to take up the matter and recommendations were forwarded to Governor Hunt telling why the law should be amended.

The question of the uniform text book law for high schools was brought up and the air became electrical in an instant. All of the educators assembled were entirely opposed to it and took the pains to express themselves after that fashion. The agitation against it was started in Prescott by Frank Hart, principal of the high school at that point, several weeks ago. The bill was arranged for road high schools as well as grade schools. It was the desire of all the school officials present to have the words "high school" struck out of the bill, and P C Philbrook of Bisbee made a motion to that effect. The motion was carried without a dissenting vote.

### Registration Books Open to Ladies

Registration for all the those qualified electors whose names do not appear upon the great register of Cochise county for the year 1912, has now been opened throughout Cochise county. The registration closes on May 1st.

This registration comes particularly for the women of the state who were enfranchised last fall.

The following, self explanatory letter has been issued by Recorder Murphy.

"Dear Sir:— By this time you have, no doubt, received the blanks sent you for the purpose of registering both male and female persons who can qualify under the law, and whose names do not appear on the General Register of 1912, which was prepared for the 1st general election.

"Registration closes on the first day of May, so those who wish to be registered must do so before that date.

### Sims of Cochise May Be President of Senate

A Phoenix dispatch to the Review says:

"It has developed tonight that upon the convening of the extra session, supporters of Senator Sims of Cochise county will make an effort to have him accept the presidency of the senate in the interest of party advantage and expediting business. Even friends of Conitt, who are personal admirers, are free to admit it would be best for all concerned if the presiding officer could be changed and Sims' ability is responsible for his name being agreed upon."

He followed a clue which led him to the arrest of a prisoner at Phoenix, who is believed to have been one of the burglars who robbed the Gilman jewelry store at Bisbee. Many watches and some of the jewelry was recovered and the prisoner was brought to the Tombstone jail. The arrest may lead to the recovery of the balance of the stolen goods and an accomplice of the prisoner. Mr. Howe has made many clever captures and is making an excellent record as an efficient and watchful officer, and his latest capture places him to the front as a sleuth of more than local renown.

Word was received here that the supreme court at Phoenix refused to grant a rehearing on the Cochise Justice of the Peace case, hence the old law stands and the former justice officials act as holdovers and the redistricting order of the supervisors is invalid. The Cochise board of supervisors called a special meeting for this afternoon to act on the decision and recognize the holdover officials by auditing their claims for back salary thus officially reinstating them.

The back salaries, for three months, amount to nearly \$6000. The salaries of the recently appointed justices now invalid are left unpaid and suit will doubtless be necessary to establish their claims.

After many months of hard work on the part of Section Director Robert R. Briggs, 31 Arizona towns will soon be equipped by the combined action of the United States weather bureau and the Mountain States Telephone & Telegraph company to receive each day after 10 o'clock in the morning complete weather forecasts for that day.

Mr Briggs started toward establishing this feature soon after he took charge of the Phoenix station, but it has only been since the consolidation of the two telephone systems that his plans could be carried into effect.

Every morning the complete forecast is to be phoned to the chief operator in the 31 towns, and a few moments later will be accessible to thousands of telephone subscribers.

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### J. C. Wamsley Charged With Libel

A Phoenix dispatch says:—

Followers and supporters of Governor Hunt are expressing great indignation over the indictment of J C Wamsley, secretary of the state prison, for libel of Colonel Thomas F Weedon of Florence.

U S Senators are being bitterly denounced for returning Wamsley's letter to Weedon and thereby furnishing the latter with the evidence on which the indictment was brought.

The indictment of Wamsley by the final county grand jury charges him with the libel.

In the indictment Wamsley charged Weedon with being dishonest and untrue and with having stolen 600 feet of sewer pipe from the prison.

### Working Hard on Message

Governor George Hunt, his secretary, Leroy Ladd, and a corps of assistants are working on the governor's call for a third special session of the Arizona legislature.

It probably will not be finished till late and will not be made public till Friday.

Code Commissioner Sam L. Patton is compiling for the governor a list of the laws that must be passed in order to complete the revision of the statutes to conform to the constitution. All these laws will be mentioned in the call.

The Gazette states Governor Hunt has declined to state what other laws are to be included in the call. He is swamped with messages from the various legislators containing suggestions and requests. Each one wants his pet bill to receive attention at the next session, which begins Monday, and only the matters mentioned by the governor in the call can be taken up.

### Rate Hearing at Phoenix

Several cases involving the long and short haul question will be heard in Phoenix April 11. Before Prof Thurtell, a special examiner of the interstate commerce commission.

One of the cases is that of B. Maier & Co of Benson. Maier & Co accuse the Southern Pacific of violating section 4, the long and short haul clause of the interstate commerce law. The rate on sugar from the coast to Benson is 90 cents a hundred pounds, and to El Paso, several hundred miles further, 55 cents.

The case of the Pacific Creamery company of Tempe, involving rates on fuel oil from the coast to Arizona, has also been set for hearing April 11, before Prof Thurtell. The corporation commission's case, attacking rates on all kinds of oil, refined and crude, will be heard April 18 before Examiner Settle.

Prof Thurtell was formerly with the University of Nevada, and he made a great reputation for himself in long and short haul cases. His record caused him to be employed by the interstate commerce commission and he is now in charge of all cases covered by section 4.

### Governor to Grant Another Reprieve

A Phoenix dispatch says:—

Governor Hunt stated positively today that he would tomorrow further reprieve W B Chaves, Miguel Peralta, William Campbell, Francisco Rodriguez, and Eduardo Perez, convicted murderers at the state penitentiary under sentence of death.

In October the Governor reprieved the murderers a chance to pass a law abolishing capital punishment. The legislature refused. Now initiative petitions asking the submission of the law at the general election in November, 1914, are circulating. The next reprieve may be until after the election.

William Faltin, another Phoenix murderer, has been sentenced to hang at Florence April 18. An appeal pending in the supreme court makes it unnecessary for the governor to reprieve him.
