Automobile Runs Down Boy

The condition of Irvin Sobey, 12 years old, struck by an automobile on the Fourth of July at Miami, just as he was about to enter the potato race near the Arizona Eastern depot, was Monday morning declared to be favorable.

Drowned in Swimming Pool

While swimming in the pool at Elysian Grove with four friends Tuesday afternoon James S Gallagher, a clerk in the auditing department of the Randolph lines at Tucson, was suddenly overcome with some sudden weakness, believed to be heart trouble, and, sinking to the bottom of the pool was drowned before help could reach him.

Medical Examiners

Dr George W Martin of Tucson is in Phoenix attending the meeting of the state board of medical examiners, which has been convened for the purpose of holding the regular quarterly examination for the issuing of permits to practice medicine.

Work On National Forests

The agricultural appropriation bill for the year beginning July 1, 1914, provides \$85,000 for use by the Forest Service for the classification or lands \$15,000 of this amount has been allowed for use in District 3, comprising Arizona and New Mexico, and this means that the work already under way will be pushed rapidly on every National Forest in the district.

Kills Father-in-Law

Mistaking his father-in-law, J A Walsley, for a Mexican intruder, R B Lewis, an employe of the Detroit Copper company store at Morenci, shot and instantly killed him late Tuesday night at the family home, when both men were in the yard searching for the Mexican. Lewis was fully exonerated by a coroner's jury Wednesday.

May Be Deported

Charged with being in the country in violation of the neutrality laws, Guillermo Borgaro was given a hearing at the United States immigration station at Tucson Wednesday. It is understood that the evidence was unfavorable to Borgaro, and in case the decision at Washington is against him he will be deported to Mexico.

Killed Accidently

By the accidental discharge of a Winchester rifle, carried on a strap by Dr J W Kehm, Antonio Villa, a Mexican laborer staying temporarily at the Kehm home in Tucson, near the El Paso & Southern tracks, was shot and instantly killed Thursday afternoon about 4:15 o'clock. Dr Kehm was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Hess and placed in the county jail, afterwards being released on his own recognizance. The inquest was held Friday morning at 9:30 o'clock by Coroner Comstock.

Glowing Tribute to Old-New Tombstone

All indications point to the rejuvenation of old Tombstone. The thousands of men scattered throughout the country who lived there in the early days would rejoice to hear that once again this sturdy old frontier camp had taken on new life.

[Clifton Copper Era]

A "souless" corporation has again come to the aid of old Tombstone, one of the pioneer mining camps of Arizona. Last week the Phelps-Dodge Company paid \$500,000 for this old property and will probably spend another million dollars in new development work in an endeavor to revive the old camp.

The following is taken from the Iron Ore, published at Ishpeming, Mich:

"The silver mines of Tombstone, Arizona, were once famous. Very rich ground was encountered and for several years the output of mineral was heavy. With added depth much water was met, and this finally terminated operations, the company's capital having been exhausted in trying to drain the surrounding limestone. A few years ago another attempt was made to unwater the mine and this was given up about a year ago, much money having been spent in the task. The Copper Queen company then secured options, and now have exercised them. This company will first give attention to the upper areas of the camp, much of which has thus far not been thoroughly explored. It is stated that the Copper Queen paid a half million for the property. Tombstone is a historic camp and well advertised far and wide in its halcyon days. It was a mecca for cowboys and gamblers and was extensively advertised, and undoubtedly much lied about by newspaper correspondents looking for the sensational."

The editor of the Iron Ore, George A Newitt, is an acknowledged and well known specialist on mining conditions throughout the United States, and recently spent several months in Bisbee, and during which time he visited the Tombstone district in company with Copper Queen engineers, then examining the properties of the T C M Company.

(Miami Silver Belt)

The purchase last Tuesday morning of the Tombstone Consolidated Mines company's property at Tombstone by Walter Douglas marks an epoch in the mining annals of the southwest. Mr Douglas is general manager in the southwest for the Phelps-Dodge company, and that powerful syndicate is certain to bring definite and speedy results from the famous Tombstone properties.

Tombstone, once the metropolis of the southwest, was given a new lease of life ten years ago when the Tombstone Consolidated Mines company installed the most powerful pumping plant in the United States in an effort to unwater the mines in an attempt to reach the gold and silver ores supposed to lie at considerable depth, but the water flow was too great and the once famous mining camp sank again to the proportions of a village. The Phelps-Dodge syndicate, however, instead to work the upper levels for ore their engineers have reported on and Tombstone is expected once again to become the scene of mining activity. The purchase price was \$500,000.

(Bisbee Review)

Tombstone Consolidated Mining Co properties at Tombstone yesterday passed formally to the hands of Walter Douglas, whose bid of \$500,000 was ordered accepted. It has been understood that Mr Douglas made the purchase for the Phelps-Dodge Co, of

which he is general manager, in which event there will be a subsequent transfer of title.

It is understood that operations at the Tombstone properties will begin with a small force of men. It is indicated that there is a good deal of prospecting to be done and that the management will feel its way along very carefully. Mistakes will be avoided and the time in which large operations can be wisely undertaken, in the event these are found to be justified, will come about just that much earlier.

Feeling there is that the Phelps-Dodge Co. is one of the very few great mining organizations with the means and the engineering ability to give Tombstone a thorough try out. The past reputation of the company for thoroughness and fairness in its work is accepted in Tombstone and of the very highest value in the way of assurance that the districts will now receive all that is coming to it. With this given, Tombstone is abundantly confident that it has an era of great mining success ahead—one in which the brilliant records of the past will be equalled or surpassed in total achievements.

It is understood that lessors will again have the privilege of getting in on Tombstone Co. properties and that among the first steps of the management will be the granting of applications for lessors. Of these there will be a number, for there is good money to be made on the properties by lessors. At the same time their work will assist the management in no small degree in making the findings which it desires.

Uses Automobile As Deadly Weapon

A Phoenix dispatch says:— Charging that Peter Boree, a taxi driver, operating between Washington street and Riverside park on Saturday night, employed his automobile as a deadly weapon when he ran down a wagon at Central avenue and Madison street in which were riding Mr and Mrs R A Hancock and several children, Assistant District Attorney Grandy, yesterday directed that a warrant be issued for the arrest of Boree.

In charging Boree with using his automobile as a deadly weapon, Prosecutor Grandy is fortified by the wording of a statute in which "assault by means and force liable to produce great bodily injury," is defined as coming under the classification of the employment of a deadly weapon no matter what may be the nature of the instrument employed.

Boree is said to have been proceeding south on Central avenue and Hancock was driving north. At Madison street Hancock started to make a turn west and Boree driving south concluded that despite the fact that Hancock had already started to make the turn, an automobile carrying passengers was entitled to precedence and continued on his way. "The automobile caught the horse in the right flank, damaged the wagon, threw the occupants to the ground and severely injured Mrs Hancock and two or three of the children aboard."
