**SPRING ROUND-UPS NOW UNDER WAY**

The spring roundups on the Cochise county ranges have just begun, and most of the companies and individual owners have started their outfits to gather the herds, on the semi-annual round-up.

Three C outfit is this week located at the Hudson ranch in the Dragoons, having started from the Brophy Windmill early in the week. They will continue to work toward the northern end of the Sulphur Spring Valley ending up in the vicinity of Wilcox, after traversing the entire valley and the Dragoon ranges.

The F outfit, belonging to the Neel estate, will start on the 20th, from the Four Bar Ranch in the Valley, and will work toward the Swisshells and on to the end of the valley up as far as Douglas.

The Boquillas round up will begin soon from Benson, although no definite date has as yet been given out from the company headquarters at Fairbank. The roundup usually begins from Benson working up the San Pedro river as far as Hereford, taking in the entire range of that company.

This year promises to be a good one for the Cochise County Cattleman, as the late rains have greatly benefited the ranges. Considerable shipping will also be done by the cattlemen the coming season, and the present high price for cattle will mean that thousands of dollars will be brought to the county this summer.

**Attended Meeting**

A. H. Gardner, went to Bisbee Saturday night to attend a meeting of the Republican County Committee, which, on account of the strict health regulations now in effect in that city caused the Committee to adjourn to Naco. The Committee decided that mass meetings of Republicans should be held on Tuesday, April 25, in the various precincts of the county to select delegates to a county convention to be held in Douglas, Saturday April 29.

Mr. Gardner invited the committee to hold the convention in Tombstone, but did not put it in the shape of a motion, stating he did this only to show that Tombstone was willing but fully realized that Douglas was too close to Rodeo for Tombstone to stand any chance during these dry days.

On motion of Mr. Gardner, Albert Sames of Douglas, was selected as county chairman. Tombstone will have four delegates to the county convention, which meeting will select thirty-two delegates to go to Tucson on May 5. Cochise county will ask the selection of Charles Overlock as one of the six delegates to Chicago and that M. E. Cassidy be made National Committeeman, stated Mr. Gardner.
