WIRELESS STATION OF UNITED STATES ARMY




Photo by American Press Association. The army authorities are depending entirely upon the wireless outfits to keep the commanding officers in touch with the detachments of troops in Mexico.

ANOTHER ATTEMPT TO SAVE CONDEMNED MEXICAN

WILL ATTEMPT TO SECURE CLEMENCY FROM THE PARDON BOARD

PHOENIX, May 6.—Upon the return of Attorney Frank Struckmeyer to the city, an appeal for clemency will be made to the board of pardons and paroles in behalf of Francisco Rodriguez, the Mexican who was recently sentenced by Judge Sanford in the superior court to be executed at the state prison in Florence on May 19.

Attorney General Jones says that he does not wish to prejudice any matter might be brought before the prison boards, but that in the case of Rodriguez, repeated appeals had been made to the board in behalf of the condemned man and just as often rejected.

Rodriguez who is sentenced to a legal death for the murder of his wife over five years ago; to Deputy Sheriff Murphy, at Florence a few days ago that he wanted to live very much, but that if he had to die he would like to have it over with soon.

REGISTRATION LAW IMPORTANT TO COCHISE VOTERS

WHO MAY REGISTER, AND OTHER POINTS OF LAW COVERING REGISTRATION

PART OF LAW COVERING FOREIGN BORN WOMAN, MARRIAGES TO FOREIGNERS

Registration for state and county elections opened Monday and the following state law covering registration in the state will be of interest to Cochise county people.

The books will be open until 5 o'clock p. m. September 1, will close then until September 18 when they will re-open, and will finally close on October 15.

Who May Register

All persons qualified should register at this time as their previous registration will not permit of their voting at the coming primary and general election.

The last state legislature amended the registration law so as to require that each elector must state his or her party affiliation.

However, if an elector should state that he is affiliated with no political party, he may be registered. But, such an elector would not be eligible to vote in the primary for any candidate whose name appears on any of the party ballots.

Foreign Born Women.

"Any woman who is now or may hereafter be married to a citizen of the United States and who might herself be lawfully naturalized, shall be deemed a citizen."

That any foreign woman who acquires American citizenship by marriage to an American shall be assumed to retain the same after the term of the marital relation, if she continues to reside in the United States unless, she makes formal renunciation thereof before a court having jurisdiction to naturalize aliens or if she resides abroad, she may retain her citizenship by registering as such before a United States consul within one year after the termination of such marital relation.

That an American woman who marries a foreigner shall take the nationality of her husband. At the termination of the marital relation she may resume her American citizenship, if abroad, by registering as an American citizen within one year with a consul of the United States, or by returning to reside in the United States at the termination of the marital relation, by continuing to reside there.

51 PRISONERS CONFINED IN COUNTY JAIL

THIRTY-FOUR ARE AWAITING TRIAL, WHILE SEVENTEEN ARE SERVING TIME

REPORTED SCARBOROUGH WILL SERVE OUT SENTENCE; DISMISS APPEAL

From the number now confined in the county jail it appears that Sheriff Wheeler and his deputies have been kept busy during the past few months.

The prisoners now awaiting trial are as follows

Four for murder, including Ed Scarborough, whom it is reported is to request that his appeal be dismissed and will serve out his sentence.

Three cases for highway robbery. Three are in for burglary.

One for conspiracy to commit burglary.

Two for statutory rape. Sixteen for introducing and selling intoxicating liquor.

Two for assisting an officer. One for grand larceny.

One for assault with a deadly weapon.

The number serving time are as follows:

Five for bootlegging. Two for simple assault.

One for gambling. Eight for petty larceny.

One for carrying a deadly weapon. One alleged insane woman who will be given a hearing as to her sanity.

JURY WILL PROBABLY BE CALLED FOR THE 22ND

CIVIL NON-JURY CASES NOW BEING DISPOSED OF BY COURT

Regular Saturday routine probate and civil matters occupied Judge Lockwood in the Superior Court today, considerable business having been disposed of. During the past two weeks, and continuing through the coming week civil non-jury matters will be before the court, in an effort to clear the docket as much as possible before the next jury term of court begins.

Batchelder are the two registration officers for the Tombstone precinct and they report a large number already registered.

At the office of County Recorder Murphy a force is busy receiving the registrations from all precincts in the county and entering them upon the register. Already the registrations are coming in fast, which will greatly lessen the work on that office. It is urged that all registration officers in the county see that registrations are secured early, thereby avoiding the rush during the last days on which the books are open.
