A chance for the city of Tombstone to get the loose rocks, and rubbish removed from the streets and alleys at a very low cost has been offered by Sheriff Wheeler, that will probably be brought up at the council meeting tomorrow night.

Sheriff Wheeler stated today that if the city would provide a wagon to haul off the waste, and provide for the noon-day meal, he would let the city have from six to eight prisoners from the county jail, who are anxious to work out their time and they could be put to work on the clean-up job.

It would probably only require a week or possibly less for the clean-up to be made, which would put the streets and alleys in first class shape.

Where fills are temporarily needed they could be made, and the balance of the rocks and trash hauled away.

The offer is a good one, and no doubt the council will accept it at the meeting tomorrow.

MANY APPLICANTS FOR REGISTRATION OF LAND OFFICE

PHOENIX, Oct. 6.—That the land office will not be long without a register, on account of the death of Thomas F. Weedin, through lack of applicants for the position is evident.

Public-spirited citizens who are willing to devote their services to the government, in this capacity, according to all reports, are quite numerous.

Among the most prominently mentioned candidates is James P. Lavin.

Another man whose name has been mentioned in connection with the place is Eugene F. Trippel. He was formerly register of the land office at Tucson, and has been connected with the state land commission for the past four years.

Others who have been named as probable candidates for the position are Frank Luke, retiring member of the board of supervisors of Maricopa county; William Riggs, of Dos Cabezas, member of the state senate from Cochise county; Andrew Martin of Tucson; J. L. Irvin of Phoenix; J. C. Goodwin of Tempe; Scott White, a former sheriff of Cochise county; C. M. Shannon of Florence and Fred T. Colter, of Apache county, national democratic committeeman of this state. There are others.

THREE-CENT FARE CASES TO BE HEARD

PHOENIX, Oct. 6.—In the United States court Assistant Attorney General R. W. Kramer was permitted by the judge to withdraw the former motion to dismiss what are known as the three-cent fare cases, three in number, and file answers to the complaints.

These cases grew out of a law passed by the state legislature providing for a three-cent fare law in the state which was decided adversely to the state, by the state court, on the grounds that it came within the purview of the corporation commission.

This commission on its own motion ordered the adoption of a three-cent per mile rate for the Santa Fe and Southern Pacific and a four-cent rate on the Globe division of the Arizona Eastern and a three and a half cent rate on the Phoenix division of the same road.

The railroads resisted the order and the cases were taken into the federal court. As 120 days must elapse under the rules of the court before an issue is joined it is probable that the cases will not come up for hearing prior to April terms.

A trial jury was called this morning in the court and the case of Richard Allen on a charge of forging a signature to a land office relinquishment was set for trial today.

On the calling of the calendar on Tuesday seven cases were set for trial between the present and October 24, and other cases will be set in the meantime, including a number of criminal cases already on the docket and such others as may be originated by the grand jury when it meets next Monday.

FIRST THRESHER REACHES SULPHUR SPRING VALLEY

DOUGLAS, Oct. 5.—The first threshing machine ever brought to the Sulphur Spring valley arrived last week at the farm of C. D. Clapp, who lives a few miles north of McNeal. It will be brought into play this fall in threshing beans and grain crops, being of a type that can be used on any grain.

Mr. Clapp has on his farm more than 100 acres of beans and about 100 acres in forage crops of various kinds. He did not buy the thresher for his exclusive use but will use it all over the valley. A large steam tractor which will be used to haul the thresher from place to place and to furnish power for threshing operation was received with it.

With the arrival of the thresher, valley farmers who were here to attend the circus yesterday said a new era of farming and particularly raising wheat, has been tried out in the valley with considerable success. The lack of a thresher compelled the farmers to flail the grain out in the prehistoric manner or to feed the whole straw to animals. Now that there is a thresher, farmers are planning to plant considerable acreage in winter wheat, which will mean a new and heavy source of income to them.

SHEEP EXPERT IN ARIZONA TO BETTER PRODUCT

PHOENIX, Oct. 5.—W. T. Ritch, of Australia, international wool expert, and the man who put the wool business on its feet in Montana and Wyoming, arrived in Phoenix today in company with G. W. Barnes, livestock specialist in the employ of the University of Arizona Extension Service to confer with wool growers of the valley.

Mr. Ritch is being sent out by the university in an attempt to interest the Arizona wool growers in bettering their crop. He is of international reputation, and is in this country for a year on leave of absence from the Australian government.

FAIR AT SAN SIMON.

According to notices received in Tombstone the fair at San Simon October 6 and 7, will be one of the biggest things of its kind ever held in that part of Cochise county. An invitation is being sent to the various candidates of both parties to appear at the town during the show and meet everyone in that part of the state.

MILLIONS OF ACRES OF PUBLIC LANDS

PHOENIX, Oct. 6.—With the survey of 3,950,000 acres of public land last year, a new record was established by the United States surveyor general's office. The regular allotment made by the interior department for the survey of lands in Arizona for the fiscal year was \$65,000. Added to this amount was about \$77,000 advanced by the Santa Fe railroad for the survey of lands within its grant, for which the government also adds one-half of the total expense. The aggregate amount spent of \$142,000, making the net cost per acre of the land surveyed four and three-tenths cents.

The regular allotment for the current fiscal year is only \$55,000 of \$10,000 less than last year. A number of parties will be put in the field at an early day for survey of land, considerable of which has been asked for by the land commission of the state, for selection to fill the donations provided in the enabling act.

Approval of the selection of 6,904.45 acres by the state for the benefit of the asylum, has been received at the United States land office. This makes an aggregate of 61,037.35 acres approved for this purpose.

COLONEL B. HATTICH PASSES AWAY AT TUCSON TODAY

The sad news was received in Tombstone today this morning at 11 o'clock, of Col. B. Hattich, aged Tombstone pioneer, after a lingering illness lasting over a period of a year.

The death of Col. Hattich will come as sad news to the countless old-timers in not only Tombstone and Cochise county, but in the State of Arizona, having been one of the state's oldest pioneers, coming to the then Territory of Arizona from Colorado, where he served in public life for a number of years. While in Colorado he was the first supervisor of Hinsdale county, to which office he was appointed by Governor Hill, before Colorado was yet a state. He was also a commissioner of San Juan City.

Leaving Colorado, with his family, he came to Arizona, locating in Tombstone, which was then the best mining city in the southwest. Establishing himself in business, an expert tailor by trade, he prospered by hard work, and after a time, retired from active business, taking up private life in the Old Camp, residing here until the latter part of the year 1913, when he moved to Tucson, shortly afterward becoming seriously ill. He was taken to Los Angeles and several times operated up on for stomach troubles, never fully recovering from the effects. He was practically an invalid from the time of his first operation until his death, and during his long illness, his devoted wife and son, Mrs. Hattich and William Hattich, remained by the bedside, administering to his every want, and sparing nothing that he might be made comfortable.

The death of course came as a shock to the immediate family, though the end was inevitably near, and they were prepared for a turn for the worse.

During his life in Tombstone Col. Hattich was for several terms mayor of the city, afterward serving as councilman from the second ward for two terms, and later as treasurer of the city. He was identified with many civic improvements carried through during his public life as an official, and was ever for the upbuilding and beautification of the community in which he lived.

Before retiring from business, and official life, Col. Hattich successfully handled a number of mining deals in the vicinity of Tombstone, for eastern buyers, which later meant much for Arizona, in a mining way, and which brought Mr. Hattich a comfortable fortune.

He was subsequently much sought after to promote mining properties in the southern part of the state by many owners, but declined further business activity. Being of an advanced age, hale and hearty, he never worried, and was always of a jovial disposition, making friends with all and holding close to him, those who knew him.

He leaves behind to mourn his passing, a devoted wife, and a daughter, Mrs. J. B. Machomich, now of Los Angeles, and a son, William
