James had the cases prepared and ready for action and they were disposed of by the court in record time, completing their labors by 4 o'clock this afternoon.

TOOK INSANE PATIENTS AND PRISONERS.

Lewis is the man who plotted to break jail just before his trial. His accomplice, Perry Jones will face a charge of burglary and if found guilty, will not doubt receive a like sentence.

Bonds were unable to be furnished and they will be brought to the county jail to await trial. A complete gambling outfit was confiscated.

Another case that against Page, resulted in acquittal, and two more cases against John Chase and W. Zackerson were dismissed by the county attorney on the grounds of insufficient evidence. Today a case against Isaac Koyko and Orvid Hongo, for burglary, was started this morning, and following the empaneling of the jury, the case against Koyko was dismissed on recommendation of County Attorney French, on the grounds of insufficient evidence, who then announced that the other defendant Hongo had been dead for some time, and it was against the deceased that the evidence would have been convicting. Judge Lockwood ordered the jury dismissed at 2 o'clock tomorrow.

HERE ON FURLOUGH.

Hoyt Ash, brother of Mrs. T. F. Sanders, arrived in Tombstone yesterday from San Francisco, on a several days furlough from the navy. He enlisted in the navy about two years ago, going to Mare Island for training and shortly afterward went to sea.
